CHOP CONDITIONS IDEAL IN THE WEST

Harvesting Will Be General Soon -Quality Better Than Last Year-Grain Quotations.

Grain quotations on the local exchange at the moment are little more than nominal and will continue so until the new crop is ready for market. Stocks of Manitoba wheat and oats at the lake ports have been reduced to a minimum, considerably below what they were a year ago, consequently what trade is being done is mainly from a hand-to-mouth nature. The dock strike at Port Arthur has also hindered business considerably and until conditions are more settled no the last few days have been ideal. Bright, warm weather has been just what the farmers have been praying for, and if continued for ten days or two weeks more, will put the crop practically out of danger. Harvesting will be almost general in some of the more favored portions on Monday, and the quality of the crop is expected to be better than in some years. The only specimen of the new wheat to reach Toronto is characterized by dealers as the best they had ever seen. Last year much wheat was damaged late in the season, and the quality of the general crop was thereby reduced. This year everything points to a more successful outcome.


