The typewritten minute book produced showed that the adjournment was recorded there as to Toronto, the word "Toronto" being, it is claimed, just slightly out of alignment, and perhaps inserted in a blank space left for the purpose, and which was one letter longer than "Toronto," so that there would have been room for "Winnipeg."

Mr. Tilley told of a directors' meeting held Aug. 9. This Mr. Rogers did not attend, being notified only on the same day. There was another meeting called by some of the directors for Aug. 10. On Aug. 9 the head office was transferred to Toronto, but this was never mentioned on Aug. 10.

Mr. Rogers said that names of directors elected March 21 were omitted and other names substituted. The shareholders on March 21 postponed the sanctioning of the transfer of 1400 shares to Manager Ostrom, pending consideration by the directors. The executive was to meet with Mr. Rogers to discuss the matter, but never did so. In April they confirmed the transfer, in a resolution setting forth that the shareholders had already passed favorably upon it, which was not the case.
