Wanted \$2.75 a Day. At the Polson Iron Works, where the pattern-makers first went out, the increase asked for was 35 cents a day. They were earning \$2.40 a day, and a deputation waited upon the manager and requested that the scale of wages be raised. The firm refused to make the increase, and, accordingly, six of the workers went out.

Will Take Them Back.

Mr. Polson said last night that he did not want the strikers to return to their jobs, as new employes could be engaged. However, if any of them returned he would not refuse to take them back at the old

wages.

The pattern-workers at J. P. Northey & Co. are also out, as the company would not agree upon the increase asked.

In the John Inglis Works, only two of the pattern-workers have stopped work; they stepped out yesterday morning. The firm notified them by a letter that their demands would not be granted. At present this firm is enjoying a rush of trade and new pattern-makers were being advartised for, several weeks ago.


BOY KILLED HIS CHUM.


