STABLE ROOM EXHAUSTED.
Ontario Jockey Club Will Start Today and Rush up a Hundred Extra Stalls.

NEW ARRIVALS AT THE WOODBINE.
Trainers Send Their Charges Along and Brisk Trials Are Now in Order.

The Ontario Jockey Club was inundated with telegrams yesterday. They fairly poured in, and all the owners wanted to know if their horses could be stabled at the Woodbine during the races. The stalls were all taken up last week or spoken for, so the committee had nothing to do but get together and decide on the erection of additional stabling. It was decided to start on Monday, and by this time next week or three days before the races, 100 new stalls will be completed. The racers continue to arrive daily.

J. S. Wadsworth's string.
J. S. Wadsworth's string of nine came in yesterday from New York. The string consists of Trainer F. A. Osborne. They are a fine-looking lot, and include two race-looking 2-year-olds, and three yearlings. Jockey J. Donohue is here to ride the jumpers for Mr. Wadsworth.
