## THE DISASTER AND CANADA'S DUTY.

The bravery and fighting qualities of our troops is not called into question. Our general plan of campaign has not been altered. It is simply a repetition of that his tactical error celebrated by Tennyson in his immortal lines on the charge of the Light Brigade. Someone has blundered. A costly and deplorable blunder it is, but it can be and will be retrieved. The disaster caused by this unexpected repetition of that tactical error will set in at once. The blow we have received will act as a tonic. It will bring the nation to its senses and call forth all its indomitable virtues. The Empire will bid defiance to its enemies with greater vehemence to-day than it did last week. If any of them seek to make trouble under cover of this disaster let them beware, for the British lion will now range in earnest. It is only when he is thoroughly aroused that his invincible prowess is shown. Canada is as determined as ever to stand by Great Britain in the outcome of the struggle in South Africa. Defeat there would mean trouble for Canada, for the Dominion is exposed to danger as well as the other parts of the Empire. Discussing the question of the medical

education of women, The Lancet gives the

following excellent advice to girls about to

enter the profession of medicine. The

advice is so excellent and so well worth
