# NINETEEN MILLS IS THE TAX RATE

## THE BOARD OF CONTROL ENDORSED

All Reductions Made by the Board were Passed Without Any Change—Ald. Starr's Motion to Reduce Aldermanic Salaries Was Unpopular With Most of the Aldermen.

The City Treasurer has prepared the following statement, showing the amount of the various appropriations granted up to the present time:

At last the tax rate has been struck. It will be 19 mills, and Council had what was expected, the chairman of the various committees made efforts to have the rate of the reductions made in their departments reduced, and, after motion after motion was made in this direction, Council, by a vote of 12 to 1, refused to pass the work of the Board of Control. Every reduction they were asked to pass was refused.

**Costly Work This.**  
It was scandalous, Ald. Crane said, that it required \$14,000 to collect the \$257,000 in water rates. There was room for a big reduction here, he declared. He pointed out that \$3,000,000 in taxes cost no more to collect. The \$14,000 did not include the pay for inspectors, etc.; it was spent for office help. It was true, Ald. Crane said, that the water rates amounted to more than \$200,000, but the balance was paid by the city, and was simply a matter of bookkeeping.

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# BOER FORCES BEING DESTROYED

## AND WAR MATERIAL SECURED

During the Last Month 2640 Were Killed, Wounded and Captured or Surrendered—Mrs. Botha's Movements—German Chancellor Says No Intervention Will Be Attempted.

**THE WOMAN IN THE CASE DIED**  
Celebrated Insurance Fraud Trial in Chicago Resulted in Conviction of the Principals.

London, June 10.—Lord Kitchener in a despatch from Pretoria, under today's date, says the number of Boers killed, imprisoned or surrendered during the last month totaled 2640. From June 1 to June 9 26 Boers were killed, four were wounded, 409 were made prisoners and 33 surrendered, and 651 rifles, 115,500 rounds of ammunition, 120 wagons and 4000 horses were captured.

**MRS. BOTHA TO REPORT.**

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# JONES' REMAINS HELD FOR FEES

## BUT WILL BE HANDED OVER TO-DAY

Coroner Powell Satisfied That Maggie Black Has a Proper Right to the Body and Should Have It—Question as to the Legality of the Charges Claimed.

**BULLET IN THE TEMPLE OF EACH.**  
The sister of the dead desperado, Thomas Jones, Mrs. Maggie Black, has not yet taken possession of the body of her brother, also Coroner Powell has consented that she should do so.

**Revolver Clutched in the Hand of the Man Told the Fatal Story.**  
Chicago, June 10.—Side by side, each with a bullet wound in the temple, the dead bodies of L. Hartman and his wife were found in their bed at the Great Black, besides that of the Coroner received an assurance from Col. Sewell, the American Consul here, that he had received word that the identification was correct, and that papers in the morgue would be ready by the time this morning, and that they would be sent on to the Coroner.

**Dispute Regarding Fees.**  
Notwithstanding the anxiety of Mrs. Black to get charge of the body, there is a dispute regarding the fees which should be paid to secure the body for burial. The body was handed over to Mr. Millard, the Inspector of Anatomy, by order of the Coroner, on Saturday night, and the Inspector provides that the body must be kept for 14 days before it is used for anatomical purposes. These two weeks' grace are given in order that relatives desirous of claiming the body may do so.

**Twenty-Seven Dollars.**  
Mrs. Black, accompanied by Mrs. Charles Rutledge, went to McCabe's undertaking establishment on East Queen-street yesterday afternoon as soon as they had received the order from the coroner, but they were informed that the bill of the Inspector of anatomy amounted to \$27, and they would have to pay that sum before the body would be handed over to them.

**Will Take Lawyer's Advice.**  
Mrs. Black was seen by a World reporter at her hotel last night, and, although very reluctant to discuss the matter, she admitted that she was dissatisfied with the charges that had been placed upon the body, but she said that if she had to pay them, of course she would do so. Her intention, she said, to see her lawyer this morning, and she would act upon his advice.

**Hartman's Father Wealthy.**  
New York, June 10.—Rose Violette's friends say that she left for Chicago a week ago to see her father, James Hartman. They also say that she met her father, who is a wealthy dealer in business in New York City. On a card which she had with her, she had written the name "Duchess Violette." From the position of the woman's body, it is thought by the police that she was killed while asleep by her husband.

**Nothing to Do With It.**  
Mrs. Benson, who removed from Chesham-street to take the residence occupied by Charles Rutledge, tonight states that the report that the dead murderer's body was taken to his brother's house, is a mistake. She is a stranger to the Rutledge family. The body was taken to the brother's dwelling on Agnes-street.
