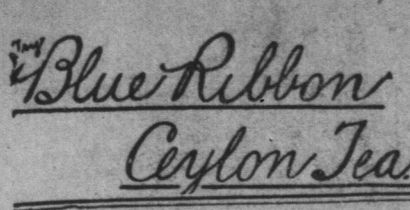

MORANG WILL SMASH THE BOOK RING AND EXPOSE THE ROSS GOVERNMENT

The Gang Having Started to Quarrel, the Truth Will Now Come Out—Writes to Be Issued Tying Up Ross Readers—A Department Honeycombed With Intrigue.

The articles which have been running in the World during the past five or six days on the Ontario Educational Department have been very timely. The government's management of the educational affairs of the province has become so grossly rotten that the department and the government can hardly hold together any longer.

Then there is the question of the Premier's printer. This is the book that was authorized before the manuscript was prepared. The author is a nice member of the ring, Hon. He is further a disturbing element because he believes in open competition in the publication of school books, as against the secrecy of ring methods.

BOY FALLS 25 FEET

Hampden, July 4.—(Special.)—About 7 o'clock this morning, a young boy, Harry May, was fatally injured by falling 25 feet from the top of the McNaughton bridge of the G.T.R. MESSRS. WALLACE AND ST. JOHN ADDRESS MEN OF WEST DURHAM

Incapacity of Both Dominion and Provincial Governments Exposed in a Forceful Manner—Dr. Hillier of Bowmanville Elected President of the Association.

The annual meeting of the Liberal-Conservative Association of West Durham was held at Bowmanville yesterday afternoon. It was intended to nominate candidates for the Local Legislature and Dominion House, but, owing to the uncertainty when the elections will be brought on, the association decided to defer placing candidates in the saddle until the fall. Notwithstanding the heavy rain and the fact that the farmers are busy with their hay, there was a good representation of delegates from all parts of the riding, among the prominent Conservatives being W. H. Ross, M. J. A. C. J. Thornton, the Conservative candidate in the last Dominion contest; J. H. Devitt, Anson Taylor, reeve of Cartwright; J. K. Allen, T. Powers, Dr. S. C. Hillier, Capt. W. C. King, P. C. Trebilcock, James Brown, reeve of Clarks, M. Massey, D. J. Gillson, Osborne, James Gale, Ed. News and others. The president of the association, Angus Stalker, occupied the chair.

Hon. N. Clarke Wallace and Mr. J. W. St. John were down from Toronto to discuss political questions with the West Durham people, but before the public meeting was called to order the association elected their officers and discussed the advisability of bringing out candidates for the approaching election. The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Dr. S. C. Hillier, Bowmanville; vice-president, J. H. Devitt, Blackstock; secretary, James Gale, Bowmanville; treasurer, Capt. W. C. King, Cartwright, Bowmanville, and E. H. McLean, Newmarket.

Organizer Wright Speaks. The Conservative organizer, A. W. Wright of Toronto, gave a lot of valuable advice to the workers in preparing the voters' list. He believed that the Ontario government did not bring on the elections right away because the Conservatives beat them on the preparation of the lists last year, and they will try to beat us on the next list. Discussing the West Durham situation, he said that the Ontario government is taking the advantage of a technicality to deprive Robertson of the seat. He was a friend of Mr. Bell, and Mr. Wallace had no money, and if we had the money, we had no desire to spend it for corrupt purposes.

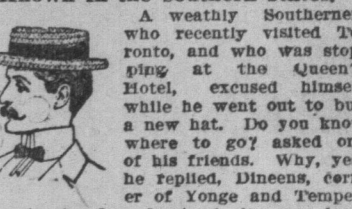

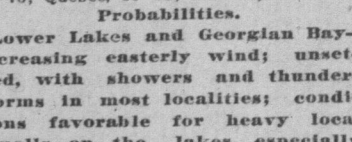

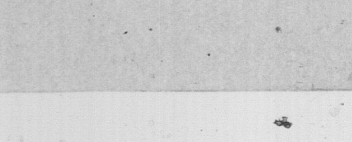
