Big Steel Concern Coming Leased Site in Hamilton

Agreement Closed Between
Nickel-Copper Co. and Pittsburg Steel Company.

Hamilton, Oct. 6.—A deal was closed to-day by which the Pittsburg Steel Company, an immense concern capitalized at between four and five million dollars, takes a lease of a portion of the Hoepfner refinery buildings in the east end for one year. This means that the Pittsburg Steel Company, which is one of the largest steel companies in that city of American steel and iron interests, will at once begin operations in Hamilton.

For some months the company, thraits president. Wallace H. Rowe, has been figuring on a Canadian location, and Toronto, Brantford and other cities were looked over. Hamilton's manifest superiority as a manufacturing centre outweighed the inducements offered in all other places, and the leasing of the Hoepfner building followed. A contract has also been closed with the Cataract Power, Traction and Light Company for power.

It is announced that the leased location is but a temporary proposition, the company being anxious to get right at work and not being able to get either site or new buildings in the chort time at its disposal. 
