PASSED AWAY

Hiram Walker, of Walkerville, Died This Morning.

Walkerville, Ont., Jan. 12.—Flags are flying at half-mast here out of respect for Hiram Walker, the founder of the town, who died at his residence in Detroit this morning. Mr. Walker retired from active business several months ago, and has been failing gradually. He was unconscious most of yesterday, and passed away at 7 o'clock this morning. Mr. Walker was born on Independence Day, July 4, 1816, and was, therefore, in his 84th year.

BIG INCREASE

IN INCOME

London Street Railway Company's Large Earnings for the Year.

\$12,000 More in 1898 Than in 1897.—Mr. T. H. Smallman Elected Vice-President.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the London Street Railway Company was held in this city yesterday afternoon, and was attended by President H. A. Everett, Vice-President E. W. Moore, and Director C. W. Watson, of Cleveland, and Director T. H. Smallman, of this city. Director H. S. Holt, of Montreal, was not present. Notwithstanding the loss sustained by the prolonged strike, the gross earnings for the year were over \$12,000 more than in 1897. The number of passengers carried in the year was 2,841,568, and the number of car miles traveled was 1,074,302. The gross earnings per capita of the population was \$2.95, as against \$101.385 in 1897.

The board of directors were re-elected, and at a meeting held subsequently Mr. T. H. Smallman was elected vice-president, in the place of Mr. E. W. Moore. President Everett was re-elected.

TANNERY BURNED

Bel & Co.'s Establishment at Tilsonburg a Total Wreck.

Tilsonburg, Ont., Jan. 12.—Bel & Co.'s tannery was totally destroyed by fire Tuesday night. The tannery is some distance out of the town proper, and the fire had made considerable headway before the firemen arrived. The total loss will amount to about \$15,000, and is only insured for \$4,000.

IMPORTANT DECISION

The Bourgogne Alone Responsible for the Ocean Horror of July 4.

When Over 500 Lives Were Lost in a Steamship Collision.

Germany With Britain in Regard to South Africa.

Anglicans Will Appeal to the Queen to Use Her Influence in Suppressing Ritualistic Tendencies in the Established Church.

London, Jan. 12.—The admiralty court today found that La Bourgogne, of the Compagnie Generale Trans-Atlantique was alone to blame for the collision with the British steamer Cromartyshire, on July 4 last, near Sable Island, off the coast of Nova Scotia, resulting in the sinking of the steamer and the loss of over 500 lives. The French company held that the Cromartyshire did not make the proper signals and ignored La Bourgogne's signals of distress.

CROP OF HORRORS PREDICTED.
Old Moore has provided rather more than the usual crop of horrors for 1899. March is going to "overturn the balance of the year for strange events." In April the pulse of England is going to palpitate; in May there will be bad news for the royal household; in June the London army council is going to prove "pachydermatically obstinate"; in July the nation will be stirred to its deepest depths; in August death will be busy; while in December the Christmas bells will be muffled in sorrow. We are to have a general election in consequence of the resignation of our most prominent minister. And the first few months of the year, to say nothing of the others, are going to give us crises in Germany, America and South Africa, together with a revolution in France. After this strikes, bankruptcies and riots are comparatively tame.

WILL BACK UP JOHN BULL.
The Berlin National Zeitung, referring to the French comments on Emperor William's visit to the French ambassador here, the Marquis de Noailles, says: "By the Anglo-German agreement in regard to South Africa, all cause of an Anglo-German conflict in that part of the world is removed, therefore there can be no question of Germany in any way allying with France against Great Britain."

FRANCE AND BRITAIN FRIENDLY.
It is stated in the best informed political and diplomatic circles at St. Petersburg that the governments of France and England are striving in every way, and in the most friendly manner, to smooth over all the difficulties existing, and considerable expectation is expressed at those sections of the press in both countries which give an opposite impression thereby headlessly and mischievously exciting public opinion. The Novos Vremya and the Novosti score them heavily.

BISHOP IRELAND'S MISSION TO ROME.
London, Jan. 12.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says: Archbishop Ireland is coming to Rome to explain his conduct during the Hispano-American war. The influence he was supposed to possess with President McKinley were in the Vatican to take certain steps which proved abortive, to the great chagrin of the pope.

The Rome correspondent of the Times says: The pope, in a letter to the American bishops of the Latin race, dated at Christmas, convoked a council to be held during the coming year at Rome. His holiness observes that he has long wished to give them another proof of his feeling for them, and has been considering seriously how best to benefit the Latins, who occupy the greater part of the new world.

"We grieve," he says, "that in the condition which we now are we are unable to entertain you in Rome as we would."

AGAINST RITUALISM.
At a meeting held in Westminster Hall last evening, a thousand members of the National Protestant Church Union were in attendance. A resolution proposed by Lord Kinnaird was unanimously adopted, appealing to the Queen to use her influence against the ritualistic tendencies in the established church of England.

PREPARING FOR PATTI'S MARRIAGE.
Great preparations are being made at Tyrion, South Wales, for the marriage of Mme. Patti on Jan. 25 to Baron Hedon, eldest son of the late Baron Claude Hedon, of Strasbourg. The townspeople will decorate the streets, and the mayor and aldermen, in their official robes, will receive the wedding party at the railway station on the arrival of the train from Craig-y-nos, and escort it to the church, where the Bishop of Mostyn will perform the wedding ceremony. The bride will be given away by Sir George Faudel-Phillips, former lord mayor of London.

CAN NOW USE ENGLISH.
In the Guernsey States Assembly, it was decided by a majority of thirteen that English might be used in addressing the house. The ballot, all the jurats but three, all the rectors, and all the town deputies and constables voted in favor of the proposal, while the Dean of Guernsey and all the country deputies voted for the use of French alone.

DISARMAMENT.
Emperor Nicholas, according to a dispatch to the Daily News from Odessa, is planning to meet Emperor Francis Joseph, Emperor William and President Faure early in the spring to impress upon them his disarmament proposals. The place of meeting has not yet been decided upon.

DOWAGER-EMPEROR IS A FIGHTER.
German Missionary Bishop Anzer, of the Province of Shantung, China, in his report received at Berlin, gives it as his belief that the Emperor of China is being put to slow death, his successor

A VICTORY FOR SAGASTA

By Combining With Weyler He Has Defeated the Opposition.

Beaurepaire Disclosures To Be Investigated by the Cabinet-Birmingham's Bicycle Trade Is Bad.

London, Jan. 12.—A dispatch from Madrid says that it is regarded as absolutely certain that Sagasta will face the cortes with the cabinet practically unchanged. Senor Sagasta has scored a great tactical advantage in rallying to his side Weyler, the Duke of Tetuan, Senor Canalejas, and Romero Robledo. With this combination it is believed that Senor Sagasta has little fear of an opposition led by Senor Silveira.
