The report of committee No. 3 on minimum wage laws was presented by Miss Helena Gutteridge, Vancouver, and was unanimous. The Government was urged to appoint a royal commission to investigate the whole matter of min-mum wage for unskilled workers, and the provincial governments were asked

to take action to insure equal tional facilities to every child. of the larger provinces female school teachers were being grossly underpaid.

E. M. Trowern of the Retail Merchants' Association, had asked that part-time workers in retail stores be not included in any minimum wage F. G. Daniels, Montreal, said he had

little time. Locality and environmen must have a great bearing on any minimum wage awards. It was felt there was not at hand the necessary data on minimum wages for unskilled workers, and an investigation was therefore asked.

Representation had been made to the committee that the remuneration paid female school teachers in one of the larger provinces of the Dominion was so low as to discourage the employment of the talent necessary to the proper education of its citizens. The committee recommended that the various provincial governments be asked to investigate such conditions in the respective provinces to the end that the children of all provinces of the Dominion may have equal educational opportunities.

Housing Problem.

James B. Fraser, Montreal, moved a recommending increasing efforts by Dominion and Provincial Governments to solve the housing prob-

ms. the need for better housing conditions, and seconded the adoption of the reso-
