## FIRST RESERVIST TO LEAVE FOR GREECE RETURNS TO LONDON

Andrew Kondaks Also Saw Service in British Navy.

Andrew Kondaks, the first Greek reservist to leave London when the call to arms came from his native land in October, 1915, is back in London again, having been discharged from the British army in the east in September of this year. Mr. Kondaks, who was in charge of the Alps upstairs dining-room at the time he left London, has come back after his four years in the army to resume charge of the cafe.

He was discharged from the Venetian army in 1916 after nine months' service, and joined the British navy, being assigned to the H.M.S. Edgar as interpreter. He left the navy for the British secret service and served in Athens and Salonica, where he remained until discharged.

"My best story? That's easy," replied Mr. Kondaks, who held the rank of sergeant-major while serving with the British. "Well, I went away from here single, and I came back triple," and with this he drew a picture from his pocket, showing himself, his wife and baby.

"I remember in March, 1918, on the Struma front when the British got the king-pin German aviator of the east. It was finally blown up after it was discovered that a lead pipe running from a monastery on the island had been supplying the submarine with gasoline and oil. The British made all the monks prisoners of war, and their monasteries were turned over to their monasteries. Mr. Kondaks was living at the monastery for a time and helped bring the monks to justice.

## Says Tobacco Perils Britain; Habit Growing

NEWCASTLE-ON-TYNE, Nov. 14.—"The nation that smokes perishes," declares R. P. Moncrieff, honorary statistician to the British Anti-Tobacco and Anti-Narcotics League of Manchester.

In the year 1917, he says, the British people smoked 132,215,700 pounds of tobacco, costing the smokers approximately \$197,600,000. Pipes and other appliances came to \$22,684,000, making a total for the year of more than \$220,000,000.

The following year the amount increased to 161,500,000 pounds smoked, and appliances costing \$23,309,000.

"If the women of the nation become habitual smokers, they are rapidly doing what effect will it have on the future generations?" the writer asks.

The query is answered by the late Sir W. B. Richardson as follows: "If a community of youths of both sexes, whose parents are formed and powerful, were to be trained to the early practice of smoking and if marriages were to be contracted to the smokers, an apparently new and a physically inferior race of men and women would be bred."

## 15,000,000 VICTIMS CLAIMED BY "FLU" IN THE PAST YEAR

Epidemic Killed Off One Per Cent of the World's Population.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 14.—In a paper read before the vital statistics section of the American Public Health Association, Drs. Frankel and Dublin of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, said that the influenza epidemic of last fall and winter caused the highest mortality among the wage workers of the country and the least among those of higher economic strata. They estimated that throughout the world practically 1 per cent of the total population, or about 15,000,000 people, died as a result of the epidemic.

The victims were, for the most part, persons in young adult life. The factors and numbers of the present generation. No one can yet attempt to forecast what the effect of this calamity will be on the future population of the world in the number of orphans, in the smaller number of children who will be born and in the reduction in the number of effective workers on the farm, in the factory and in the office. They said that the epidemic was more disastrous in causing loss of life than the great war.

In a group of 31 life insurance companies, between October, 1918, and the end of March, 1919, more than \$120,000,000 was disbursed in claims paid due to influenza and pneumonia. These represent nearly 48 per cent of the total claims paid in this period. The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company alone paid more than 120,000 deaths claims for nearly \$25,000,000 because of influenza and pneumonia deaths. Including the disbursements of the war risk insurance bureau, the estimated total loss to America life insurance resulting from the epidemic was well above \$250,000,000.

According to the statistics quoted by the speakers, this epidemic seemed to be different in many essential respects from other influenza epidemics. Most of the deaths occurred among persons between the ages of 15 and 40 years, with maximum incidence about age 30; secondly, the white race in the United States seemed to be affected much more severely than the colored; thirdly, the epidemic was much more severe in character in the coast cities of the United States, and in the cities of the Atlantic seaboard, and became much milder in its destructive effect among the inland.

The epidemic was responsible also for an increase of 16 per cent in the death rate of tuberculosis, an increase of 500 per cent for diseases connected with childbirth and 21 per cent for heart diseases.

The writers concluded that from the health statistics available to them, there did not seem to be any present focus of influenza in the United States and Canada; nor did they view with alarm the immediate prospect of the health situation. There did not seem to be any indications that the epidemic was approaching.
