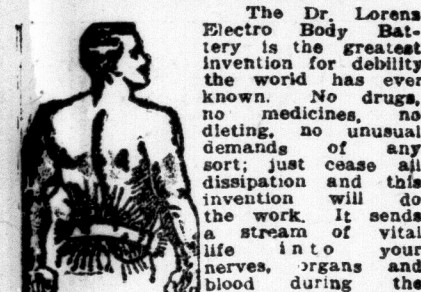

WANT GOVT. PROBE INTO SAND-STEALING FROM THE ST. CLAIR

Alleged That Americans Are Exploiting Deposits On Canadian Side.

CHATHAM, June 11.—A Government investigation into the removal of gravel from the River St. Clair by a marine interest was demanded by Kent County Council, when it adopted a recommendation of the legislation committee to that effect this afternoon. The report charges that the waters are being exploited by persons not citizens of the country for the benefit of American contractors. The report said that the committee's information is that deposits on the American side have been practically exhausted, and that operations carried on in Canadian waters is rapidly depleting Canadian deposits.

The council also adopted a recommendation that the county constable be given authority to prosecute residents of the vicinity of Sydenham River, for using the river and its embankments as a depository for rubbish.

A resolution was passed authorizing the county engineers to prepare specifications and secure an estimate of the cost of building a memorial hospital in that town at an estimated cost of \$33,000, and requested that the council contribute \$20,000. The request will be dealt with later on in the session.

NOT GUILTY, SAYS JURY, IN ESSENHOFFER CASE

Charge of Stealing Flax is Withdrawn by Crown.

GODERICH, June 11.—After hearing evidence all day in the case of Joseph Essenhofer, charged with false pretenses, the jury this afternoon returned a verdict of not guilty. The case is the third on the county court list before Judge Dickson.

The other charges of stealing flax from the Huron Flax Mills Company, Limited, in which the grand jury also brought in a true bill, was withdrawn by the crown. Charles Garrow and J. Best of Seaford appeared for the defendant. The other civil cases will start Saturday morning without a jury at 11 o'clock.

WANT FUEL CONTROL CONTINUED IN CANADA

Border Chamber of Commerce Appeals To Dominion Government.

WINDSOR, June 11.—An appeal was wired the Government at Ottawa today by the Border Chamber of Commerce asking that in view of the extreme shortage of coal, provision be made for a continuance of the office of the fuel controller for the Dominion after July 1.

Commissioner Scandlers declared today that nine operators in the United States were following the policy of the fuel in Canada with poisons in shipping to foreign countries, where more acute conditions had forced up the price of coal beyond what are available in America.

The local chamber petitioned the Government some time ago to place an embargo on the export of potatoes, which are selling here at \$7 a bushel, and are extremely scarce even at that figure.

OXFORD ASSESSMENT WILL REMAIN SAME

Next Year's Figure, However, Will Be Determined by Valuers.

WOODSTOCK, June 11.—The equalized assessment for the county of Oxford will remain the same for 1920 as last year, but for the year 1921 the assessment will be determined by valuers who will be appointed by the council. L. E. Peterson and E. E. Hamner have been appointed representatives of the county on the Children's Shelter board.

Alfred M. Ingelby, for 25 years pressman with the Sentinel Review, leaves Monday to accept a similar position with the London Free Press.

Today he was presented with a fine club-bag by his associates.

Early today the building on the corner of Dundas street and Norwich avenue, known as the old brewery, was totally destroyed by fire, thought to have started from a spark from a molding machine recently installed in the building.

HALDIMAND FARMERS TO PLACE CANDIDATE IN FIELD FOR FEDERAL ELECTION

CAYUGA, June 11.—The U. F. O. meeting held in the town hall Monday was largely attended. Warren Stringer, local representative for the Legislature, addressed the meeting and reviewed the work of the session.

A canvass will be made to increase the stock of the Ontario organization, and it was agreed that a candidate would be placed in the field for the federal election.

ONTARIO HISTORICAL SOCIETY ELECTS OFFICERS

Interesting Addresses Mark Closing Sessions of Annual Conference.

OWEN SOUND, June 11.—The following officers were elected at the morning session of the Ontario Historical Society: President, Gen. E. A. Cruikshank, Ottawa; first vice-president, Dr. Orr, Toronto; second vice-president, Miss P. A. Redmond, treasurer, Col. A. E. Belcher, councillors, H. F. Gardiner, W. Andrew Band, Miss E. L. March, Prof. J. L. Morrison and Prof. E. A. Lang.

Rev. Canon Spencer of Hamilton, who came to Owen Sound 67 years ago, was the speaker this morning, giving a detailed account of his voyage from Portsmouth on the sailing vessel, Prince Albert, when a mere lad. Landing in New York, the party proceeded by train, boat and stage coach to the little settlement on the shore of Georgian Bay. Canon Spencer described life in the bush in those early days, and spoke of the gradual clearing of the land, establishing of churches and schools, and concluded with congratulations to the new city of Owen sound.

Afternoon Session. In the afternoon the program included an address on the Tecumseh Assignauk family by H. G. Tucker of Owen Sound. He gave the history of Francis Assignauk, a nephew of the famous Indian leader Tecumseh, which proved not only interesting, but instructive.

The next speaker, C. W. Hartmann of Clarksburg outlined the progress of the township of Collingwood, and the towns of Thornbury and Clarksburg. Dr. Hammill of Meaford told the interesting history of that town in a very interesting way.

The convention was closed with a public lecture in the city hall by Professor J. L. Morrison, M.A., professor of history in Queen's University, on his experiences with Allenby in the Palestine campaign. The lecture was largely attended.

CAYUGA, June 11.—The funeral of Mrs. McFadden, an aged resident of Cayuga, took place on Tuesday afternoon from St. John's Church to the rural cemetery. Mrs. McFadden died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Brown, in Buffalo, and the remains were brought to Cayuga on Tuesday morning.

FOUR COWS KILLED BY LIGHTNING; TWO CALVES UNHARMED

WATFORD, June 11.—James Thompson, fourth line west, on Wednesday night discovered four dead cows on Cecil McNaughton's farm on the second line. They had been struck by lightning in the recent thunderstorm. Two of them had young calves, which were quite unharmed. The loss is only partly covered by insurance.

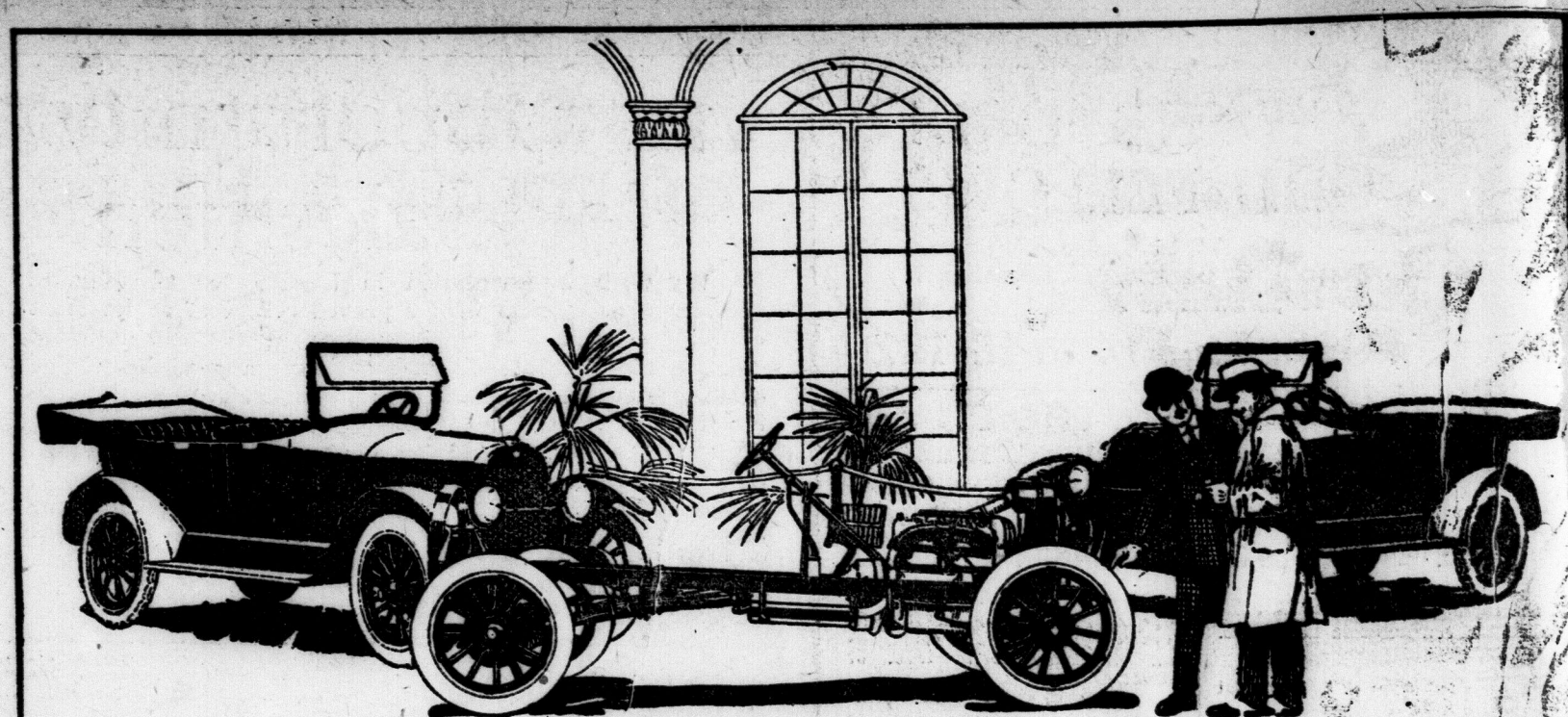

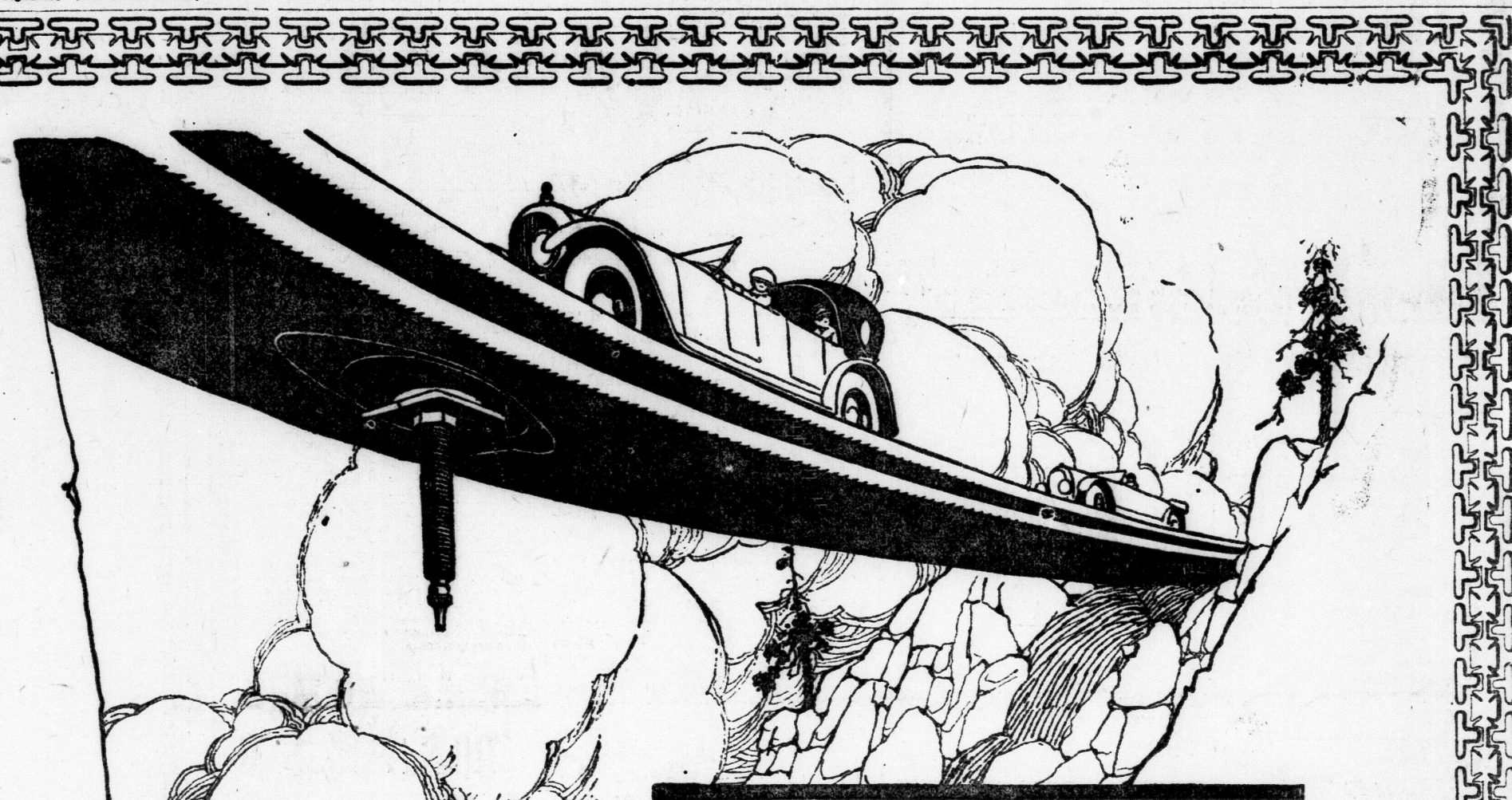
