Where Harriman Will Rest.

Harriman's new country home at Arden, N.Y., where he will take his "after cure." cost him \$2,000,000.

The house is in the middle of a fifty thousand acre tract in Orange County, N.Y., two miles from the village of Arden. In selecting the site Mr. Harriman chose a spot where maiaria could not reach him, and where he could enjoy the best of mountain air. The house is on the top of Tower Hill, one of the highest mountains in the Ramapo range. An incline railway, fitted with a steam windlass, which draws a cable car, has been constructed from the foot of the mountain to the hogse. At the top of the incline is a broad entrance driveway, bordered by a high wall of dark blue granite. Near the entrance to the house is a courtyard, with flower beds, a splashing fountain and shady, cool arcades.

The house is of plain American architecture, built entirely of huge blue granite rocks, quarried from the surrounding mountains. The interior woodwork was carved largely in Harriman's turning mill from oak, pine and chestnut trees cut on the estate. The main entrance hall, which is 30 feet by 60 feet, is wainscoted to a height of forty feet with oak. Out of the entrance hall on the east there is a long corridor with wainscoted walls and an elaborately carved ceiling. Opening from the corridor on the south are the loggia, dining rooms and principal living rooms. The windows of these rooms give a view over the hills in the direction of larden and twenty miles beyond.

The second floor is given over entirely to sleeping and living rooms. Every room has an open fire-place. On the third floor is Miss Harriman's library and the living and sleeping rooms for Mr. Harriman's sons. Near the house is a two-acre play-ground and a swimming pool for the boys, while on an island in a lake on the estate Mr. Harriman has built a camp for himself. Mr. Harriman'senlarged his Arden estate yesterday by the purchase, thru agents, of Forest Lodge, a landmark of Orange County. It comprises 200 acres.
