## AT THE THEATRES

#### Madame Nazimova.

Madame Nazimova's second appearance in Toronto will be inaugurated at the Royal Alexandra theatre, next Monday night in "The Passion Flower," a play by Brandon Tynan. Interest in the appearance of this prominent actress will undoubtedly be keen, for she has accomplished in a few years more than many elder players have taken years to reach. She is conceded by the most critical, a revelation. Her youthful stands out so prominently that it but adds to the sincere admiration offered her brilliant acting, with the naive touch so innate to gestures of the foreign born, and a face of great beauty and fascination.

Madame Nazimova's role of Vivien will astonish her many admirers for it is radically different from the parts with which her name has commonly been associated. The play itself is a big success for it tells a story of things within the grasp of the metropolis. #### Bay Street Property Sold.

Sir Henry M. Pollitt has purchased the five-story building, 84 Bay-street, from Mark Fisher, Sons & Company, for \$70,000.
