**GLASGOW DRINKING CLUBS WIDE OPEN**

Closing of Saloons There Would Not Mean Much Towards Temperance

Glasgow, April 4.—(Correspondence) Several of the labor delegations which urged upon Chancellor Lloyd George the advisability of total prohibition of alcoholic liquors during the war, made a particular point of the fact that any such prohibition, to be effective, must apply to private clubs as well as to saloons and hotels.

While this was urged partly on the ground that any such prohibition should operate equally upon all classes, it was also observed that in many towns it was also felt that to close the bar-rooms and leave the clubs open, Glasgow is the most striking example of this, for the workingmen's clubs here are very numerous, and they practically all serve liquor.

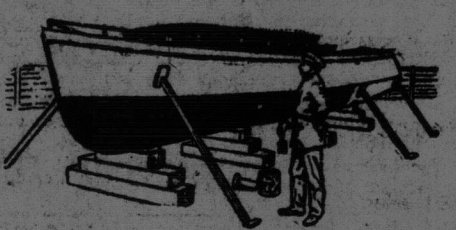

**THREATENED STRIKE ON I. C. R.**

A Letter From Local Secretary—Action Taken in Halifax

Editor Times—Sir,—By the morning paper it is to be noticed that A. R. McArthur, grand president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railroad Employees (a dual organization of the International union comprising railroad men) has threatened to call out the maintenance of way employees on the I. C. R. who may happen to belong to the Canadian Brotherhood in hopes to help him tie up the road. My advice to all such men is not to sacrifice their positions on the I. C. R. by complying with Mr. McArthur's ultimatum, especially at the present time when the British government needs all the help that it can possibly get without placing any obstruction to prevent immediate despatch of all supplies for our aid at the front.

The policy of all international unions in Canada at this time is to prevent trouble while the war is in progress.

In connection with this, a Halifax despatch says that at the April meeting of the Halifax Trades and Labor Council a communication was received from G. W. Murray, general chairman of the Maintenance of Way Employees, charging that President McArthur of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees had been attempting to usurp the right to negotiate a schedule for the men employed at general track work. It was stated that these men are now covered by a working agreement between the International Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and the management of the Canadian government railways. Mr. Murray also charged that Mr. McArthur had the sole right to represent maintenance of way men, and letters in support of his statements were read from the minutes of railways and from General Manager Gutelius, together with copies of letters of warning alleged to have been sent out by Mr. McArthur.

The Halifax Trades and Labor Council endorsed the action of Mr. Murray, and the executive was instructed to draft a letter pledging him every support and to send copies of the same to Premier Borden, the minister of railways and A. K. Maclean, M. P.

**POLICEMAN MARSHALL MAY HAVE TO FACE ANOTHER CASE**

Frederick Gleaner, Saturday.—As a result of his treatment of Abraham Zall, a local Jew, engaged in purchasing hides in the market this morning, Police Officer Charles Marshall, an ex-St. John policeman, will likely face a charge of assault in the police court. Zall had purchased two hides from a farmer in the market and had taken them into the market building to weigh them. He placed one of the hides on the scale and left the other on the floor, while he went out of the building to get the man from whom he secured the hides. Marshall met Zall near the door of the building and told him not to leave the hides on the floor. The Jew went on to explain but Marshall grabbed him by the throat and threw him down the stairs leading into the building. Zall suffered painful bruises about the knees, besides having his trousers torn. He made his way to the police magistrate's office, but Magistrate Limerick was just going into court and told Zall to see him in the office this afternoon. Zall said that he would lay information against Marshall.
