Furlough of Year—Brother Leaves Soon to Resume Mission Work

She is just commencing a year's furlough from missionary work in Korea. She is a member of St. David's church, and in a peculiar sense is a representative of that church in Korea, as the congregation is responsible for her salary, and has been carrying out this obligation for 20 years.

During her furlough Miss Robb will visit the churches in the Maritime Provinces in the interests of the missionary work of the United Church in Canada in the Korean field. Miss Robb's many friends are glad to find she is in such good health and spirits. She has a wonderful story to tell of the progress of Christian missions in Korea.

Rev. A. F. Robb, her brother, is also a missionary in that country and has been visiting his mother in Saint John. He leaves today to return to Nova Scotia and is soon returning to Korea, having nearly completed his year of furlough in this country.

Mr. Robb's family will remain in Canada for a time, and his wife and children are now residing in New Glasgow, N. S.
