

TELLS OF WOMEN'S MEETING IN NORWAY

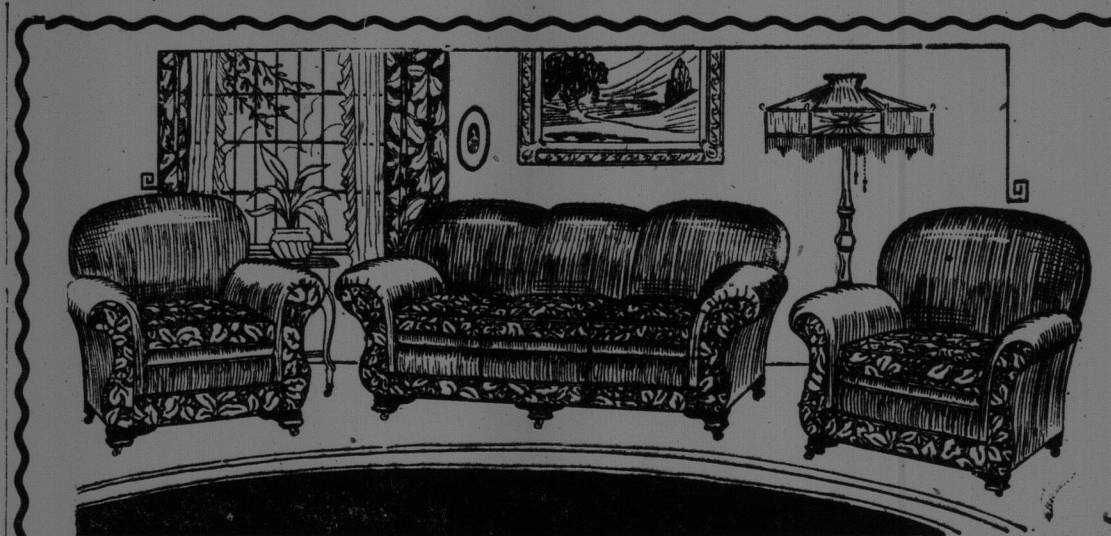
Mrs. Walter Vaughan Gives University Women Interesting Report.

The great possibilities of the International Association of University Women in the "formation of the international mind" were presented graphically by Mrs. Walter Vaughan, president of the Canadian Federation of University Women in her address before the St. John University Women's Club in the Natural History Society's rooms last evening when Mrs. Vaughan spoke impressively of the international convention she had attended in Christiania last summer and described what she had seen of the people and country of Norway. There was a large audience to hear Mrs. Vaughan and Miss Helen Smith, president of the local club extended the thanks of the gathering on the motion of Mrs. George F. Smith, seconded by Mrs. Margaret Lawrence, president of the High School Alumnae.

Mrs. Vaughan prefaced her address by expressing gratitude to St. John and to the St. John High School of which she is a graduate. She paid a special tribute to Dr. George U. Hay, who was principal of the High School when she was a student. Telling of the International Federation of University Women, Mrs. Vaughan said it now had representatives in 20 countries, including the United States, which has 20,000 members, Great Britain, Canada, France, Czechoslovakia, Finland, China and Austria and hoped to have join with it representatives of the central countries of Europe. It was unthinkable German women should be refused admittance as the Federation stood for progress in thought and should forgive and forget more readily than nations could hope to do.

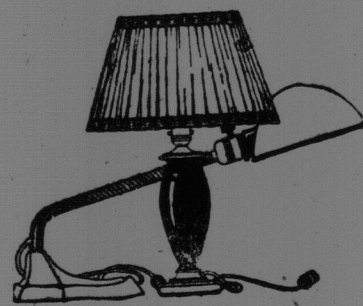

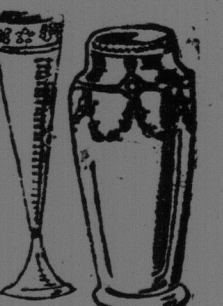

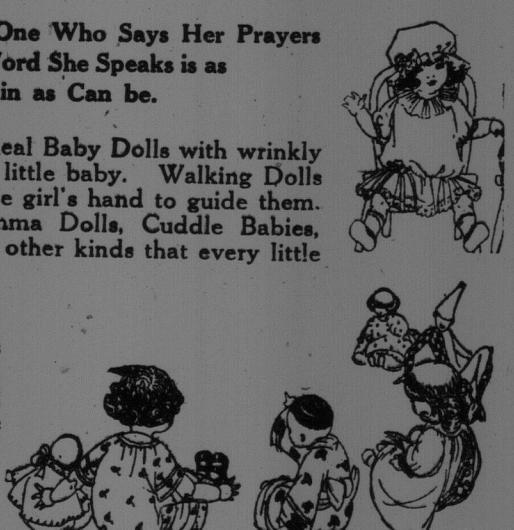

Mrs. Elizabeth Henderson.

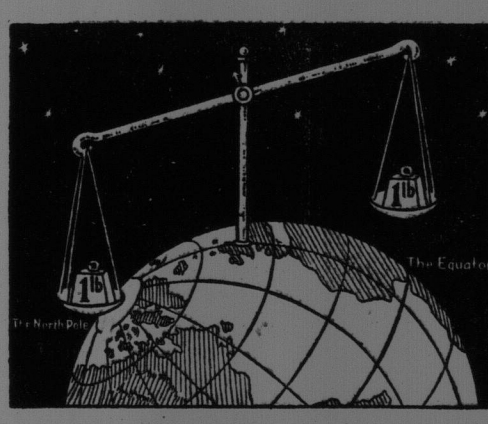

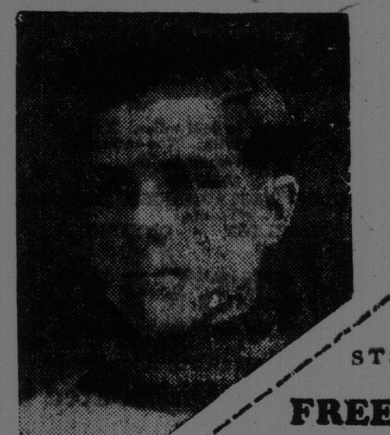
