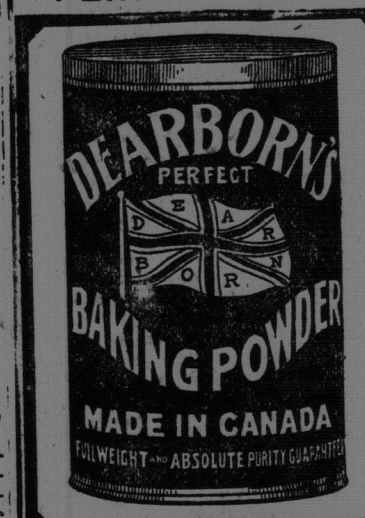

JUBILEE OF STANFIELD'S LIMITED

Pioneers of Woollen Business in Canada
Celebrate Half a Century of Success.

Truro, N. S., Feb. 19.—Friday was Stanfield's day. In Truro for the first time a convention of Stanfields Limited came to a close that night with a banquet tendered by the mayor and town council to the officers, business executives and salesmen of this great manufacturing organization, now the chief industry of Truro and one of the most important in eastern Canada.

The late C. E. Stanfield, who came from his uncle's mill in Buxton, England, and built a mill at Truro, Prince Edward Island, some fifty years ago, was one of Canada's pioneer woollen men. He knew his business thoroughly and brought with him those sterling British qualities of honesty, thoroughness and careful workmanship which quickly made his goods sought after by his neighbors. Looking for wider fields, he came to Truro and built two mills, finally building a third and larger one on the site of the present Stanfield mills, where the first Cardigan jackets and Bannockburn tweeds made in Canada were knitted.

When the late C. E. Stanfield retired from business, the Stanfield mills were sold to his sons, John and Frank, who grew up in the business and are still the active heads as president and vice-president respectively.

Ever since John and Frank Stanfield have guided the destinies of this organization, they have consistently used publicity to tell the merits of their goods to the Canadian people, for they realized that no matter how good their underwear might be, the quickest and most economical method of acquainting the people with its merits was to advertise in the newspapers. That this has been a wise investment is proven by the steadily increasing demand for Stanfield's underwear, the sales of which in 1920 amounted to \$3,000,000.
