A conference attended by the city commissioners, a delegation from West St. John, and Percy W. Thomson, manager of the New Brunswick Power Company, was held in the mayor's office this morning regarding removal of the street car tracks from Queen square, West St. John. Mr. Thomson, after the delegation was heard, asked for a few days before giving a definite reply, as he expressed the desire to take the matter up further with the directors of the company.

The delegation, which was led by W. E. Scully, M.P.P., presented practically the same case as last week.

Mr. Thomson said that in his opinion if the tracks were removed from Queen square they would not be laid in any other street. He suggested, however, that the company might consider a change in the route of the whole west side system which would practically do away with the southern half of the Queen square toop. The plan would be for a ten minute service from the ferry up Rodney street, along Ludlow, Tower and Lancaster streets to Dufferin row or Clifton street and then along Lancaster avenue to the bridge. This would put the whole of the west side into one circuit instead of two as at present.
