Naval Officers and Halifax Visitors Guests of Mayor

Mayor Schofield, with a fine appreciation of the fitness of things which was the subject of most favorable comment, took advantage last evening of the presence of representatives of the Royal Navy and of the rowing associations of Halifax in the city to bring together and representative St. John citizens at dinner in the Union Club. The fair was entirely informal, and enough guests were present to fill a table running the whole length of the large dining room. The addresses delivered in proposing and responding to the toasts breathed a spirit of appreciation of the navy and the greatest good fellowship toward the oarsmen of Halifax and their friends.

Mayor Schofield presided and had on his right Captain J. D. Stewart, of the Cambrian, and at his left Messrs. Scribner and MacIntyre. He addressed the table late senators, members of the city council, and prominent business and professional men. He toasted the King had been honored, the mayor called upon Chief Justice McKewen to propose the health of the navy. The Chief Justice in an eloquent address reviewed the exploits of the Royal Navy, expressed the view that the dominions might fairly accept a larger share in the maintenance of the navy and bade a very cordial welcome to the naval guests of the evening.

Mr. Scribner reminded his hearers that he had been coming to St. John for many years, and once went home the winner of a hundred yard dash on the track. He had a story to tell of the old Bicycle and Athletic Club days and when there was competition in hockey and still more in connection with boat races. He, too, rejoiced that St. John was again actively in the game. J. Gregory was asked to propose as a representative of West St. John, Mr. Gregory noted the fact that most of the St. John men who had won high honors in rowing were from the west side. Mr. Scribner referred to Hilton Belyea as a worthy St. Johner. He very heartily endorsed the statement, adding that he believed such arrangements which led to great physical and mental pleasure to St. John representatives at sea, and that he was glad to see the St. John men and the men of Halifax.

Responding to this toast, General MacDonnell, who came in from the silent navy and its great work. He spoke also of the work of the military forces, and on behalf of his own corps, he cordially thanked the mayor for his kind invitation to be present at the meeting.

The majority of the children spent last night with their foster parents, some of whom had come to St. John to get them. So bright and attractive were the little strangers that there were more homes wanting than there were little Ukrainians and it is expected that some more orphans from that distressed country be brought for adoption in the maritime provinces shortly.

The children spent a very happy day yesterday. They were taken from M. Budovitch's house, in Douglas Avenue, where they had spent the night, to his summer residence at Gondola Point. They went out and returned by automobile in their interest. A bountiful supper was served to them before they returned. When they arrived in St. John, they were met by Mrs. M. Budovitch, Mrs. C. H. Johnson, Mr. B. Cohen, I. Ellman, I. Jacobsen and for another child who is to remain in St. John there is a little uncertainty as to which home it will go to; in Woodstock, Mr. Kantor has taken two children, a brother and sister; Sackville, Mr. Berman; Halifax, Mrs. Schwebel and Mr. Yanovsky; Sydney, Mr. Steeklin, Mr. Marcus and Mr. Gault; and at Glace Bay, Mr. Hanburg.



LARGE REQUESTS TO INSTITUTIONS

One of a Million, One Half Million and Another \$800,000. Massachusetts Institute of Technology will receive \$1,000,000 and Wellesley college \$500,000 from the estate of Francis Appleton Foster of Weston, director of several textile mills, who died recently. Seth T. Sprague of New York, a nephew, is bequeathed \$200,000 and named as executor. Miss Caroline H. F. Sprague, a sister, is left \$350,000. Numerous small public bequests also were made, including \$1,000 to the Fall River Boys' Club. No valuation was placed on the estate.

NO RUM THERE FOR SNAKE BITE
