MARINE NOTES

The S. S. Cape Premier sailed from Glasgow on Wednesday for this port to load a cargo of lumber for Stetson, Cutler & Company.

A wireless message was received at the local office of the Furness Withy Line this morning from the captain of the S. S. Walter D. Munson stating that he expected to arrive in port on Sunday.

He is bringing a cargo of raw sugar to the Atlantic Sugar Refineries.

What the Furness Withy Company have announced approximate sailing dates of two of their lines as follows:—St. John to London, St. John to Antwerp, St. S. Messina on December 12, and the S. S. Castellano on December 12.

Captain Lyndon, marine superintendent of the France and Canada Steamship Corporation, was in the city this morning in the interests of the S. S. Lake Stobi, which is loading sugar for a port in France. He left on the noon train for Halifax. The Lake Stobi will complete loading this evening and is expected to sail tomorrow.

The Furness Withy Company expect to have eight more boats sailing from Montreal before the close of the season, five for Manchester, one to London and two for Antwerp.

A new steamship company, owned and operated by Boston interests, has just opened offices in Boston. It is the Inter-Coast Steamship Company, of which Capt. Arthur I. Crowley, formerly vice-president and general manager of the Coastwise Transportation Company, is president and general manager.

The new company has a fleet of 18 steamers, three of which are in the off-shore trade. The company will engage in general cargo carrying.

ternative proposal which he had made in October that the government relieve that in the committee stage of the bill he would offer an amendment limiting the amount that the arbitrators might give to \$25,000,000 sterling. Senator Fowler of New Brunswick declared himself against the measure on the ground that the price was out of proportion to the value, that the success of government ownership had not been established, that the present financial condition of the country did not warrant

that the government had no mandate, that it infringed on the principle of Canadian routes for Canadian trade, that it was not desirable to spend Canadian money for the purchase and maintenance of railways in the United States, that it would lead to discrimination against Canadian winter ports in favor of Portland.

Senator Mitchell expressed himself against the bill because he did not see why three arbitrators should be brought in to perform a duty which should be performed by the government and parliament.
