FOUR LINERS IN
RACE TO MONTREALFirst in Will Be Exempt From
Part Wharfage Dues

Montreal, March 22.—The prospects are fairly good for a well-contested race up the St. Lawrence at the opening of navigation this year. The Cunard "Utania" will leave Southampton on April 18, and is expected in Montreal on the 28th. The Donaldson line "Casandra" will leave Glasgow on April 29, and is expected to reach Montreal on the 29th. The Allan line "Tunisian" is to leave Liverpool on April 18, and will arrive about the 27th. The White Star-Dominion S.S. "Canada" will be in this great trans-Atlantic race, leaving Liverpool on April 20 and should reach Montreal on the 28th.

It will be seen that there are four vessels definitely scheduled to sail for this port nearly the same time, and the honor of reaching it first is regarded as more or less the blue ribbon achievement of the shipping season.

It provides sufficient inspiration for the captains to bring their ships up with as little delay as possible. In past years it has been customary for the harbor commissioners to exempt the first ship up from all or a part at least of her wharfage dues, consequently this fact renders the achievement one of material value. The first C. P. R. boat up will be the "Lake Champlain," which is due to arrive here on May 3.

WHAT THE MARKETS DID

(Toronto Globe)

Live hogs are 25c higher in Ontario markets this week, and 15c to 25c higher in Montreal.

Prices of milk cows and springers dropped \$10 to \$15 per head on the Toronto market, and common butchering cows were 25 to 40 cents per hundredweight lower, as compared with last week's figures. Well-finished cattle were firm at the same prices as before.

A slight reaction occurred in the wholesale butter market, prices now standing at 37c to 38c for creamery prints, after advancing to 40c last Wednesday. There were no important variations in the prices of grain. The movement was extremely light in Ontario, and the notion prevailed among the dealers that the farmers have marketed the bulk of last year's crops. Competition from French millers had a detrimental effect on Ontario's export flour trade, and prices for 90 per cent. winter wheat patents had to be lowered from 10c to 15c a barrel. A number of Ontario mills are running only half time.

Potatoes are 10c a bag lower, both in the wholesale and retail markets.

Will Move to Moncton

(Moncton Transcript)
The Hawlock Mineral Spring Co., Ltd., has about completed its arrangements for transferring its bottling plant from Hawlock to Moncton. It has accepted the inducements offered by the City Council and will move as soon as the building for the plant is completed.

The building, which is to be erected, has for the present dimensions of 90 feet in length by 40 in breadth, and will be two stories high. The foundation and the floors will be of concrete, not only the first floor, but also the second. The superstructure itself will be either of concrete or concrete blocks, which is a matter of detail yet to be finally determined. The roof will also be of similar fire-proof material.

CAMP SUSSEX

Sussex Record.—It is understood that recommendations have been made to the militia department with a view to increasing the accommodation at the local camp ground. At present the facilities for training are none too extensive and some inconvenience has resulted in the past from this defect. It will not be long before more of the newly broken ground will be available for drill, and this will mean that new lines will have to be established. The organization of the Dragoons, last year also made additional stables desirable and this and other changes are understood to be on the programme.

DESTRUCTION THREATENS

NOTED MOSCOW CATHEDRAL

None Other in the World Like St. Basil
—Walls are Cracking

Moscow, March 22.—The Cathedral of St. Basil, on the Red Square in Moscow, is one of the most famous buildings in the world and ranks with the leaning tower of Pisa in interest. A report just made on its condition by a Moscow architect shows that, if prompt measures are not taken, this remarkable building is likely to share the fate of the Campanile at Venice. The walls are cracking and may give way at any moment. The caretaker has been allowed to store furniture and rubbish in the left, so that there is also a danger of the church being destroyed by fire.

As Gautier said, St. Basil's Cathedral is without doubt the most strange monument in the world, recalling nothing that one has ever seen, and belonging to no acknowledged style of architecture. It is a terrible and so astonishing with its amazing domes and coloring that he is said to have had the architect's eyes put out in the belief that he should not build a similar church in any other city, and that it should be the sole pride of Moscow. It is to be hoped that immediate steps will be taken to safeguard this historic building.

NOW FOR MEN'S FASHIONS

Paris, March 22.—M. Pierre de Trevis, illustrating the French dandy in "La Liberté" on the subject of the season's fashions for men, says:—

"The current fashion of ease will mark the cut of clothes in the coming season. There will be no more of the pseudo-American style with shoulders like sacks of nuts, dipping coats half-way down to the feet. The stiff geometrical elegance, smacking of Euclid, which has marked the London cut is just as unsatisfactory as the American fashion. The well-dressed Frenchman is completely at his ease; his clothes have a graceful suppleness which makes them adapt themselves to the lines of the body.

"The outlines of the trousers require grave consideration. Straight trousers are often troublesome. We have done with the ostentation of the conquerors of the First Empire, and few men of fashion will put up with tight clinging garments. Wide trousers, on the other hand, no matter how carefully one wears them, always look rather slipshod; so much so, that some cutters would like to revive the 'pig-top.' Fitting tightly around the ankle and falling straight down to the foot, or at any rate a neat look. Six inches from the ground exactly, the straight fall of the cloth is broken in the slightest possible way. It is a mere bagatelle, a mere nothing, but this nothing is a 'room in itself, and makes the arch of the aristocratic foot stand out in all its beauty.'

LAND TAXES WIN

(Hants Journal.)
Seattle, Washington, is the first large American city to adopt the single tax. At an election held recently, Hiram C. Gill, the former mayor, and George C. Cotterill, were the candidates for mayor. The latter ran on the single-tax issue, the former's campaign cry was "an open town." The result was that Mr. Cotterill was elected by a small majority. This result was brought about by the socialists, whose candidate had been defeated in the primary election, uniting on the single-tax advocate. Under the new law all buildings and personal property will be untaxed, the city revenue being raised from taxes on land values and the franchises of the public service corporations. The voters authorized the installation of a municipal telephone system.

We hope the time will come when the "single tax" will prevail in this country. There are men in this district who hold considerable land, on which the tax paid is merely nominal, while others who own a small site with a building or buildings thereon are taxed to the extreme limit of what the property would bring if offered for sale. There is not the slightest doubt that the present mode of taxation is a deterrent as regards the improvement of properties, for owners hesitate before they add to their buildings or improve what they already have, having in view the annual visitation of the assessor. The editor of the Pictou Advocate speaking on the same subject says:—

"A citizen suggests to us that there is need of a number of houses to rent at a fair rental. The trouble is that the value of a man makes improvement to his property his taxes increase. There would seem to be need in the east for some of that western medicine of exemption of taxation on improvements." Let it be known that property improvements will not be subject to tax over and above what is at present paid on the same property, and in a short time there may be something doing, and work started to give employment to master mechanics and other workmen.

Seattle has made a move in the right direction. It means progress, and the sooner other places follow in the same line the better will it be for the communities where the "single tax" is adopted.
