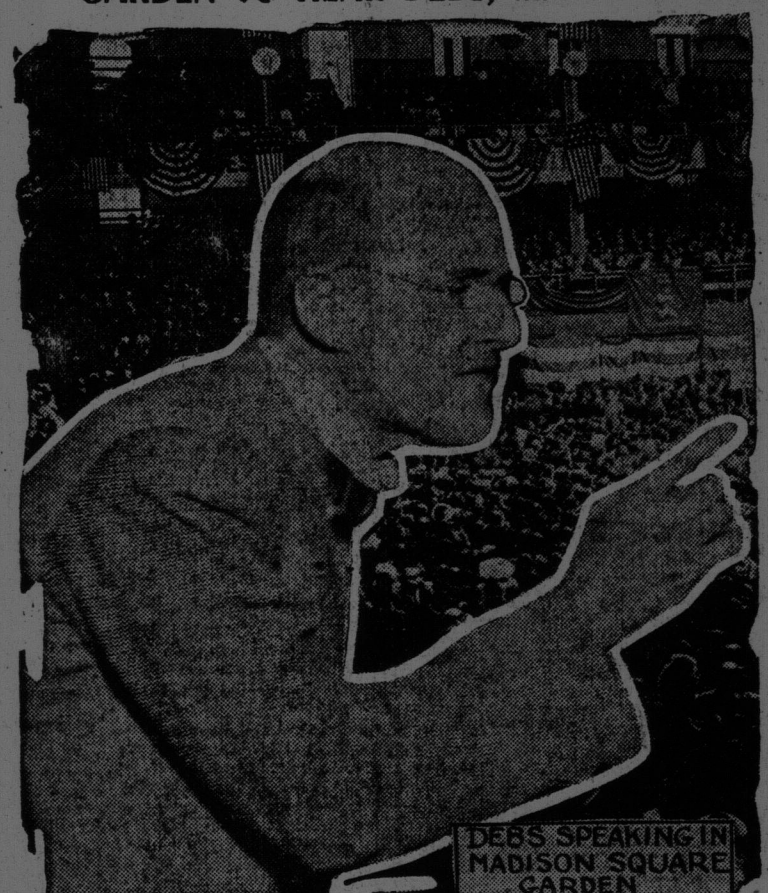

ELEVEN THOUSAND IN MADISON SQUARE GARDEN TO HEAR DEBS; MANY OUTSIDE



DEBS SPEAKING IN MADISON SQUARE GARDEN
ASSOCIATED CHARITIES
Miss Robertson Reports on Her Visit To the States

A meeting of the board of Associated
Charities took place yesterday afternoon
in the Y. M. C. A. rooms. W. S. Fisher
presided and it was decided to have the
annual meeting for the annual meeting,
which will take place during the last part
of the month. It is hoped that the citizens
will attend the meeting and hear the re-
ports and tender suggestions as to improve-
ments.
Miss Grace O. Robertson, the newly ap-
pointed secretary, presented a report on
her trip to Boston, where she visited the
headquarters of different charitable institu-
tions. The work of the Associated Charities
in Boston is divided into districts, and
each has its own secretary. It is the aim
of the association there to help individual
families, but the general working plan is
practically the same as that of St. John.
Miss Robertson also visited the quarters
of the Children's Aid Society. This is an
organization which helps children left with-
out support. If a family is deserted by
its father the society steps in and has the
power to put the children in homes and
see that they learn trades and afterwards
place their parents and where they will
have a chance of becoming useful men and
women.
The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty
to Children, with the aid of the state de-
partment, looks after children in the ju-
venile courts and other work along the line.
Miss Robertson also visited the settle-
ment houses, where night schools are run
and special courses in home management
are given to mothers.
The free dispensary was another im-
portant feature of the work in Boston. Here
special attention is given to the treatment
of tuberculosis, eye, skin, nervous and men-
tal cases. The eyeglass is tested and pa-
tients are helped by being provided with
glasses at a reduced cost. The work of
the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty
to Children particularly impressed Miss
Robertson, and she recommended that a
law be passed in New Brunswick along the
lines of that in force in some of the United
States, by which persons who ill-treat
their children are punished and in the
case of desertion the father or mother can
be brought back from other states and
can be made to support the children. If
children are neglected they can be taken
from their parents and placed in homes
where they receive instruction.
The co-operation of the different societies
was a feature which greatly impressed Miss
Robertson, and she thought that co-opera-
