OLD CHURCH AT COCAGNE IS TO BE RE-OPENED

One of the oldest churches in this part of the province, the Anglican at Cocagne, will be re-opened on next Sunday after being out of use for 90 years.

Originally founded when Cocagne was a thriving shipping centre, says the Monrovia Transcript, and great quantities of lumber were sent to the other side of the Atlantic, the church served many of the prominent families of Kent and Westmorland counties as a place of worship.

An interesting relic about which a controversy has raged for a great many years, is the bell which hangs in the old-fashioned belfry. It is claimed by some that it was brought to Cocagne after it was removed from the Shannon, the victor in the famous Chesapeake and Shannon fight of the war of 1812.

(Continued from page 1.) In a note book were reported found the addresses of several people, mostly women, living in various parts of New Brunswick.

The police this afternoon reported they had identified Davis as the man that terrorized the town of Newcastle about June 8 and who gave the North Shore police force a merry time for several days. At that time a search of the entire North Shore was made for the individual but he evaded arrest at the time. He was then known under the name of Edwards.

The police investigations by the local detective department revealed that the man's right name is Daniel O'Brien, wanted for burglary in Newcastle as well as for burglary in St. Stephen, with a police record in New Brunswick and Maine. O'Brien is being held by the local police for the St. Stephen authorities. No charge is being directly placed against him on the police books here.

Burglar's Tools in Car. Davis is said to have reached St. John yesterday in a large Packard runabout. The chief of police of St. Stephen asked this morning if the car had been out nearly all last night and did not return to his hotel in Mill street until this morning.

SEATTLE'S MAYOR GETS SEVERE JOLT

Acting Mayor Starts to Clean Up Town and He Hastens Home.

(United Press.) Seattle, Wn., June 27.—Prince Ras Taffari of Abyssinia, on his recent trip to Paris, took along five of the most powerful chiefs as they wouldn't start anything against him at home while he was gone. He was, indeed, a wily Ethiopian.

Mayor Edwin Brown probably regrets now that he didn't take Mrs. Bertha Landes along as one of his official party instead of leaving her as active Mayor of Seattle.

Mrs. Landes, the wife of a University professor, has fired two chiefs of police in the last 24 hours. She is expected to discharge a hundred or more policemen today, and so disrupt

Brown's municipal organization that he will find a comeback almost impossible. The acting mayor has expressed her determination to "clean up" the city. Yesterday she became chief of police herself, and issued a proclamation, declaring the existence of an emergency.

Mayor Hurries Home. New York, June 27.—Mayor Edwin J. Brown of Seattle, an alternate to the Democratic National Convention, left this morning for his home following reports that the acting mayor had ousted the chief of police and was threatening to dismiss about 100 members of the police department.

The Mayor said he was not worried, but was in a hurry. He says the acting mayor gave Chief of Police William B. Severyns, a "blanket order" to close gambling places, and bootleggers' establishments, according to information.

"Seattle is a clean city," the Mayor says. "We closed many places just before I left town, to have everything clean when the feet came in, but a blanket order like that is like telling somebody to locate 100 acres of blue sky, or telling automobiles not to run over people."

Mayor Brown is philosophical. "Well," he said, "Shakespeare says, 'Men, given a little brief authority, play such fantastic tricks as make the angels weep.'"
