More For Drunkenness and More For General Offences.

Police Court Figures Show Fines in Prohibition Cases Much Below 1925

Police Court figures, issued through the courtesy of Police Magistrate Hen-derson, this morning, show that the arrests for the year, those for drunk-enness and the cases in the City Court were all greater in number than 1924. The total of the receipts from liquor fines, Police Court fines and City Court for 1925 is \$18,928.70. The Police Court receipts amount to \$6,759 as compared with \$7,401.50 for 1924, and \$6,759.80 for 1928. The City Court brought in \$1,169.70 this year as against \$1,283.25 last year and \$1,237.-75 in 1928.

PROHIBITION FINES.

The liquor fines were down to a third of last year's amount, being only \$10,000 as compared to \$32,100 in 1924 and \$27,282 in 1923. Aurests for drunkenness in 1925 were 637 this year as compared with 529 in 1924 and 574 in 1928. Total arrests 1,065 in 1925 compared with 931 for 1924 and 1,176 for 1929.

The cases in the City Court num-ered 2,341 in 1925 and 2,662 in 1924. The 1924 figures in detail are:
