The Union Explosion

Other Particulars Regarding
the Fatal Accident in
Mine No. 4

of the Injured Men Are Still
in a Precarious Con-
dition.

American Successes

Otis Reports That the Filipinos
Are Disappearing Before
Advancing Troops.

Aguineldo Abandons His Soldiers
and is Now Hiding in
Benguet.

Alamo, B. C. Dec. 13.—The following additional particulars regarding the Union which occurred at Union on January evening reached this city last night.

The fireman had gone his rounds and before the accident, and there was a mass of gas in that part of the mine when the explosion occurred.

About 10 o'clock on Monday evening, the men working on the afternoon shift were in the lower part of the mine in the diagonal slope of Union mine when they were lying aside their tools preparing to go out, to the roof of the mine about 30 feet from where they were, settled down some 18 inches, and in a large quantity of gas which burst of air carried towards the men where the men were working with lights.

The gas came in contact with the lights and exploded.

Washington, Dec. 13.—General Otis reports from Manila that the insurgents are at the end of their resources from a military point of view, and are willing away before the rapid advance of the American troops at all points and says:

"General Young reports his extreme northern forces have captured rifles and property with all the insurgents' transportation, and released all the Spanish prisoners in the section, to the number of about 2,000. Our casualties were two wounded.

"Our troops are still pursuing the remnant of Tino's command.

"March reports from Cayan on the 7th instant that he has destroyed Aguinaldo's body guard, killed General Gregorio Pilar, received the surrender of General Concepcion and staff, killed and wounded 52 insurgents, released five hundred and 500.

The exploring party which entered the mine immediately after the accident was composed of the following persons: Ag. He had apparently been knocked down by the force of the explosion and lay motionless on the ground, as suffocated by the afterblast. His body was burned to a crisp. Jones had been traveling a hundred yards at the time the explosion occurred, and was not hurt. He was the only man in the party who survived. The

not at all disfigured. The injured men are H. Fairburn,ompson, J. Guthrie, arc, J. Guthrie, and Lawson and Al. Koy. Two Japese men were injured by the accident, but not seriously. The six men who were were taken to the hospital, where re being cared for.

Fairburn and the Chinaman have not returned from the shock, and it is thought they may die. Both are buried about the head and hands. J. Jones was married and leaves a wife and a 7 year old son.

Harold Zucchi leaves a widow and three children in Italy.

The funerals of the deceased miners take place to-day, and the mines remain closed down until after the 15th inst.

The jury was empaneled yesterday morning and viewed the place the accident occurred. A verdict will be rendered until Mine Inspector reaches Union, Mr. Morgan being for the scene of the accident on the 15th of Nanaimo this morning.
