ATTENDING PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

To the Board of Management of the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge. GENTLEMEN,—The health of the inmates during the past year has been fairly good. In the early part of the winter a large number of them suffered from influenza, mostly of a mild type, but in' several instances with fatal results.

Thirty two deaths occurred during the year in the three houses, divided as follows:—

Country House, 17; Moore Convalescent Home, 5; General Hospital, 4; Royal Victoria Hospital, 2; Notre Dame Hospital, 1; City Refuge, 3. Total, 32.

The total for last year was nineteen. The great increase is, to some extent, accounted for by the larger number of persons under the control of the management, as the Moore Home is included.

One half of those who died were considerably over 75 years of age. Seven of them were over 80, so that in a general way, senility might be called the cause of death.

The institutions are visited at all times when called upon to do so, and it is satisfactory to state that the instructions given by the medical attendants are carried out with a zeal and will that reflects credit upon the staff of both the Country House as well as the Moore Home.

As predicted last year, the Moore Home is gradually becoming better known and appreciated by the general public, and has been the means of greatly benefitting numerous cases convalescing from protracted illness.
