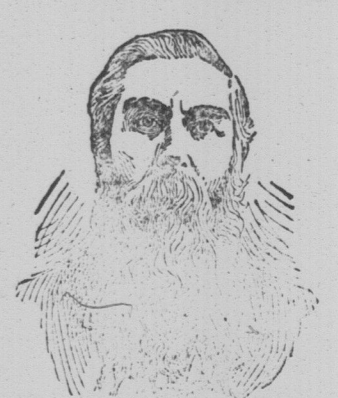

## THE CRISIS IS OVER!

### SIR CHARLES TUPPER COMES TO THE RESCUE AND PEACE IS RESTORED.

### SIX MINISTERS RETURN.

And Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper returns to his Father.

## The Anonymous Letter Case.

The most exciting week known since "Pacific Scandal" days. Good offices of Sir Frank Smith, George Taylor, Mr. Kenyon and others. Parliament now expected to go on as usual.

## THE GRAND OLD MAN.

In yielding to the solicitations of his friends and holding out the olive branch of peace to his dissenting minister, Sir Mackenzie Bowell has shown that everyone knows he possessed his unwavering devotion to the Conservative party; and he deserves the hearty thanks not only of the party but of the country at large for the manner in which he has sacrificed his personal feelings, which were no doubt deeply hurt by what he felt as a severe impingement of his ability as a leader by his colleagues. Not only the dissenting ministers unworthy of a word of praise for gracefully withdrawing their request for the immediate retirement of the Premier, but also the colleagues to remember is that the interests of the Conservative party as a whole should always be held in view.

## CHANGES IN PORTFOLIOS.

Although no official statement will be made until this afternoon, it is understood that the general outlines of the arrangements for re-organizations are completed, but that there yet remains some details which have not been entirely finished. This re-arrangement is necessitated by the fact that none of the dissenting ministers can resume the same portfolios they have retained without seeking re-election, and for this reason they will, at least temporarily, take charge of other Departments. Thus it is considered probable that Mr. Foster will take Trade and Commerce for the present, but that after the address is adopted he will return to his old Department and deliver the budget speech and pass the estimates through the House. To Sir Charles Tupper honor assigns the Department of the Interior, while Mr. Daly, it is said, will be transferred to Justice. These assignments of portfolios are, of course, mere guesses work, as to which whatever is really known as to what portfolios the different ministers will take temporarily, although it is believed that most of them will, after a while return to the position they had before the resignations.

## HOW THE TROUBLE AROSE.

As stated in last week's letter the difficulty between Sir Mackenzie Bowell and seven of his ministers arose out of a decision on the part of the ministers to induce Sir Mackenzie to retire and advise His Excellency to call on Sir Charles Tupper, who was thought by them to be a stronger man to lead the party. When the announcement was made to Parliament last Tuesday that these gentlemen had resigned, Sir Adolphe Caron, as leader of the House of Commons, moved an adjournment of the House until the 21st inst. in order to give Sir Premier a chance to reconstruct the ministry. This was objected to and the House adjourned until Wednesday. On that day Sir Mackenzie Bowell became convinced that he would be unable to form a cabinet and went down to Rideau Hall to tender his resignation to His Excellency and advise him to send for Sir Charles Tupper. His Excellency, however, was not prepared to accept the resignation and pointed out that a speech had been prepared for him by his responsible advisers and delivered by him to Parliament and Parliament must stand with that speech in some way or other. His Excellency further stated that unless Sir Mackenzie could reconstruct his Cabinet in a few days and pass the address in reply to the speech his resignation would be accepted. This was announced in both Houses on Thursday and an adjournment was granted until today. At first there was very little hope of Sir Mackenzie succeeding in his task, and it was expected he would be forced to resign and that Mr. Laurier would be sent for. ## TUPPER TO THE RESCUE.

Meanwhile a number of friends of both the Premier and the dissenting ministers, prominent among whom were Sir Frank Smith, Mr. George Taylor, chief Government whip, Mr. T. E. Kenny, Sir Donald Smith and Senator Drummond were hard at work endeavoring to effect a compromise and get the old ministers to go back. An appeal was made to Sir Charles Tupper Sr. and on the invitation of the Premier he had an interview with him last Saturday when he was asked to enter the Cabinet under Sir Mackenzie's leadership for the present with the understanding that Sir Charles should assume the lead. Sir Charles Tupper Sr. assented to this on the conditions that all the ministers, with the exception of Sir Mackenzie Bowell would not agree to. He was willing to take back all his old ministers except Messrs. Foster, Haggart and Montague but would not consent to their return, and so the matter rested until yesterday. Then another attempt at reconciliation was made which proved more successful and the hatchet was finally buried with the indications that it will not be dug up again except to bury it in that common enemy, the Opposition.
