FREDERICTON NEWS.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 4.—Citizens were shocked last evening to learn that Douglas Black, a popular young man, and son of John Black, ex-M. P., was lying at death's door as the result of a revolver shot. A gentleman was passing up Government Lane, when his attention was attracted to groanings and cries just below Wilmot Park. On examination he found young Black dangerously wounded from a revolver shot discharged by himself, but whether premeditated or not remains to be seen.

Early in the evening the young man purchased the revolver at Neil's hardware store, and before leaving his mother to go up town, took an affectionate farewell of her and secretly deposited a letter addressed to her upon her desk, the contents of which have not as yet been made public. After the discovery he was conveyed to Victoria hospital in an insensible condition and medical aid immediately summoned. At first his life was despaired of, but the constant application of the best surgical skill in the city, has so far saved his life. This morning Dr. Crockett, Atherton and Geo. N. Babbitt attempted to locate the bullet with an X-ray machine, but were unsuccessful. Tonight a second attempt is being made, but so far without success. It is believed that he cannot live. Mr. Black has of late years been employed in New York in the insurance business, but returned here a few weeks ago and assumed position on the Gleaner newspaper as a reporter.

A runaway occurred last evening on Queen street. A team driving down collided with another standing on the street, causing the horse to run away and breaking the carriage. The occupants, Miss Maria Sinclair and Miss Rowan of Lincoln, and Allan Glastier, were thrown out and barely escaped serious injury. The rig was completely demolished.

B. C. ELECTIONS.

The Latest Returns Leave the
Result in Grave Danger.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 4.—The British Columbia elections gave neither party a working majority, the result being practically even, with four points still to hear from. Eighteen liberals have been returned, 17 conservatives, 3 socialists and one labor representative. The liberals carried the whole ticket of four men in Victoria, while the conservatives carried the five seats in Vancouver, where Joseph Martin, liberal leader, was one of the defeated candidates.

Premier McBride won by a large majority in Dewdney, but his provincial secretary, Hon. Mr. Goodeve, was badly beaten in Rossland, and the election of Hon. R. F. Green, minister of mines, is in doubt.

The liberals elected were: W. B. McInnes, Alberni; Dr. J. H. King, Cranbrook; Jas. Murphy and Harry Jones, Cariboo; C. W. Munroe, Chilliwack; W. C. Wells, Columbia (acclamation); John Oliver, Delta; E. C. Smith, Fernie; J. B. Brown, Greenwood; W. W. Patterson, Island; J. A. McDonald, Rossland; H. Tanner, Saanich; R. L. Drury, G. Cameron, J. D. McNiver and Richard Hall, Victoria city; S. Henderson, Yale.

The conservatives elected were: Dr. Young, Atlin; Hon. R. McBride, premier, Dewdney; C. E. Pooley, Esquimalt; Geo. A. Fraser, Grand Forks; F. J. Fuller, Kamloops; A. McDonald, Lillooet (acclamation); John Houston, Nelson; T. Gifford, New Westminster; Price Ellison, Okanagan; T. Taylor, Revelstoke; F. C. Cotton, Richmond; Vancouver city, Hon. R. F. Tatlow, minister of finance; J. F. Garden, Hon. Chas. Wilson, president of the council; W. J. Bowser and A. H. B. McGowan; Ymir, Harry Wright.

The seats still to hear from are: Kaslo, where R. F. Green, minister of mines, is looked upon as a victor; Comox, uncertain; Skeena where C. W. D. Gifford, conservative, is leading; and Similkameen, uncertain.

The final result will be unsatisfactory, as with the seats still uncertain, divided between the two parties, neither will have a working majority, and a second appeal to the people may be necessary.

EARLY MORNING FIRE.

Wm. J. Rutledge's Residence in Lower
Cove Destroyed.

An alarm was rung in from box 43 about 1.30 o'clock this morning for a fire in a house on the corner of Pitt and Britain streets, owned and partially occupied by Wm. J. Rutledge. Henry Jefferson and wife had rooms in a part of the house, which was destroyed with all its contents.

Mr. Rutledge said that he and his two nieces, the Misses Rutledge, were in the house at the time. He heard a crash of one of the windows, and upon getting up saw the whole place alight. He was sleeping upstairs, and immediately ran downstairs, where he awakened his two nieces, who had two small children of a neighboring family stopping with them. They all barely had time to get some clothing on and make their way out of the house. Mr. Rutledge threw some bed clothing over his head and rushed through the flames to a door.

Considerable furniture was destroyed, on which there was little or no insurance. A piano, which Mr. Rutledge paid \$500 for only a short time ago, was a total loss. The house was insured for \$800 in the Commercial Union Fire Assurance Company.

The fire, it is believed, started from the hall stove, and the flames when first seen were going up the stairs. There were four bedrooms and a large hall upstairs. Downstairs were two parlors and two bedrooms. In the basement were three rooms.

BOYS' BRIGADE.

The 1st Saint John company of the Boys' Brigade formed up in the school room of St. John Presbyterian Church last night and marched up into the church, where an address was made to them by Rev. Dr. Fotheringham, who took for his text Eccl. 11: "Rejoice O young man in thy youth, and let thy heart cheer thee in the days of thy youth; and walk in the ways of thine heart, and in the sight of thine eyes; but know thou, that for all these things God will bring thee to judgment."

Dr. Fotheringham in the course of his address said that the 1st Saint John company of the Boys' Brigade in Canada was organized May 3rd, 1889, and was the first company formed in America. The present membership is 30. George J. Smith is captain. In connection with the company there is organized a Boys' Guild Christian Endeavor, which meets at 10 o'clock every Sunday morning and is conducted by the boys themselves.

Dr. Fotheringham then spoke of the legitimate pleasures of youth as expressions of vitality and incipient power. He next pointed out the responsibility which rested upon youth for the exercises of all their faculties and the accomplishment of the ends of life. He insisted strongly upon the necessity of a definite purpose if real success would be attained.

CAPE BRETON DROWNING.

HALIFAX, Oct. 4.—What is feared to be a drowning accident is reported today from North Sydney. On Friday afternoon William Vardy, captain of the sail yacht Marguerite, and Douglas Hackett, the 15-year-old son of Councillor Hackett, went in a sail boat on a duck shooting expedition. They have not returned. Late today an oar was found floating near the shore which was subsequently identified by the owner of the boat as his. A new cap was also found, which is thought to belong to Capt. Vardy. Near the oar was found floating a dead duck. The boat had 250 pounds of ballast, and the belief is that in trying to secure the duck the boat was upset and filling with water sank at once to the bottom. Both occupants could swim, but each had heavy rubber boots on, so that it would be impossible for them to make much progress. It is also thought that Capt. Vardy, who was an excellent swimmer, lost his life in trying to save that of the boy.
