VIENNA, Sept. 6.—A lawyer, who is in the confidence of Lt. Count Matta-cisch-Keglevitch, and who has just returned from visiting the Princess Louise of Cobourg, declines to reveal the whereabouts of the princess. He gives a statement which he says sh pected to be rescued by the court.

The princess said: "Now happily am free and shall use my liberty so tha I can remain free.
