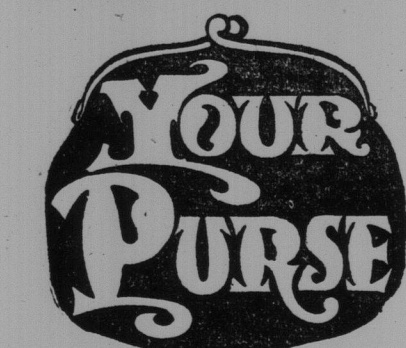

SENT UP FOR TRIAL.

Frank S. Vickery accused of Forgery His Father's Name—John McCalliff Sent to Dorchester.

AMHERST, Feb. 2.—Frank S. Vickery, accused of forging his father's endorsement on a forty dollar note on the Bank of Nova Scotia, Oxford, appeared before Stipendiary Magistrate of Oxford for examination and was committed for trial at the supreme court. He has been admitted to bail.

Judge Morse today sentenced John McCalliff to two years in the penitentiary at Dorchester for stealing a fur coat from the store of Hoffman and Co. W. T. Pipes, K. C., appeared for the crown and the prisoner was unrepresented. Evidence was produced identifying the accused as leaving the coat, which was identified by Mr. Hoffman as the one stolen, at Baker's store, to be called for. The prisoner denied all knowledge of the matter, and pleaded not guilty. McCalliff belongs to St. John, but has resided in Sydney for some time. He is a man of middle age.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 3.—The Dawson City team defeated the Trojans here this evening with a score of 2 to 0. OPERATION WAS A SUCCESS.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—The operation performed by Dr. Lorenz a few days ago in Vienna on Miss Fielding was carried out successfully and exciting results are hoped for, but as Mr. Fielding says, "time will tell."
