**LONGBOAT WINS**  
FROM J. J. DALY  
Letter Failed to Finish in Four Mile Race—Dead Heat Between Wood and Galbraith.

**TORONTO, July 21.**—One of the greatest athletic events ever held in Canada was given at the Island Saturday by the Irish Canadian Athletic Club. The four mile race between Tom Longboat and J. J. Daly, the Irish champion was somewhat of a disappointment to the crowd, Daly quitting shortly after the three mile mark. Longboat set a terrific pace at the start and at half the distance Daly seemed in distress. The first mile was made in 4:50-4 and on the next lap Daly took the lead evidently for reducing the pace. Two miles were made in 10:24-15 with Daly setting a slow pace. Longboat spurred at the 2 1/4 mile mark and was never headed, his lead at the three miles being about 60 yards. The time was 15:35-5. Just after turning the three mile mark Daly gave up and Longboat finished, paced by Nils White in 30:55. Immediately after Daly quit the crowd ran over the field and cheered their idol on.

**R. K. Y. C. CRUISE ENDED YESTERDAY**  
Services Held at Millidgeville Instead of Carter's Point—Eloquent Sermon by Rev. Lindsay Parker

The R. K. Y. C. annual cruise came to an end yesterday. The usual sermon of the chaplain, Rev. Dr. Lindsay Parker, was held at Millidgeville in the club house, instead of at Carter's Point, as was at first intended. The heavy rain made it impossible to have an outdoor service, and the commodore ordered the fleet to weigh anchor for Millidgeville.

The boats left Carter's Point in the morning and had all reached here by four o'clock, that is all except the Rose, Walter S., and the Privateer, which went to Fredericton.

Rev. Dr. Parker preached an eloquent sermon, which was listened to with great interest, and as usual it was especially appropriate. A large number of Millidgeville people and other visitors were present.

The cruise was one of the most delightful ever held by the club, there not having been one rainy day until yesterday. Coming down the Jersey some of the boats plowed up the mud, and the yachtmen said they thought they should be paid something for dredging. On their return from Grand Lake they came to Hampstead and then to Bellefleur and from there to Oak Point, and back to Carter's Point. The last couple of days they did very little sailing, but spruced around in the sun and thoroughly enjoyed themselves.
