LOCAL NEWS

The remains of Miss Margaret Harrington, who died in Boston, reached the city on the Boston express at noon today for interment here.

The Tobique dam committee of the Board of Trade meets at a meeting to be held on Wednesday in the Board of Trade rooms, Prince Wm. street.

A special meeting of the directors of the Fernald cemetery will be held tomorrow afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms.

A meeting of the executive of the Canadian Club will be held tomorrow evening at five o'clock, when plans for the next meeting will be considered. It is understood that some very good speakers are in view.

The Exhibition Association is calling for tenders for the new buildings which are required for the Dominion Fair. Plans and specifications will be on view at their office after March 2nd, and tenders will be received up to March 12th. The new buildings will be the Horticultural Hall and the grandstand.

This morning the ambulance responded to a call for a woman named Myers to the General Public Hospital. Upon arrival the woman was refused admission as the physicians said she was insane and could not be treated there. The woman was returned to her home in the ambulance.

The petition asking that a local option vote be taken in Sidney and Stanley wards at the forthcoming civic elections will shortly be referred to His Worship Mayor Bullock by a delegation from the temperance workers. The petition must be signed by an equal number of the voters in the wards and must be in the hands of the Mayor at least forty days before polling day.

Frank Curran, of the I. R. C. news department, was returned from a trip to Upper Canada, in which he went as far as Guelph. He was on the Maritime express which met with an accident near Charlottetown on his way north. On this occasion after a wheel of the sleeping car broke, the train travelled four miles smashing the rear trucks into junk. Mr. Curran speaks very highly of the energy and enterprise displayed by Conductor Heine, of Moncton, who was in charge of the train.

GENERAL AMNESTY FOR THOSE WHO FAILED TO CLEAR THEIR GUTTERS

Magistrate Announces That Such Charges Will Not be Considered in Future Unless Made in a Formal Way

This morning Police Magistrate Ritchie spoke at some length on the report made by the police against one hundred and forty-eight citizens for not having the sidewalk or gutters in front of their premises cleared of snow. He cited the by-law showing that the snow must be levelled off the sidewalk half-way on the road, and the gutters must be cleared. In carrying out this law there must be some reasonableness used by the officials. The authorities are not satisfied with the citizens clearing off only their sidewalks and not keeping the gutters clear. They can make the usual and proper complaint to the chamberlain, who can bring the matter up for trial. For the present the citizens who were summoned to court on Saturday are not required to come to court again unless the complaint is made in writing in the proper way.

CORSICAN WILL DOCK HERE ABOUT FOUR O'CLOCK

Had One of the Worst Trips in Her Experience—Most of the Passengers Left at Halifax.

Allan Liber Corsican, in command of Captain J. T. Gambell, will dock at Point at four o'clock this afternoon, after the rough trip from Liverpool in her history. The steamer was delayed by the weather from the time she left Liverpool until she reached Halifax. The Corsican brought 1000 passengers over, 800 leaving the steamer at Halifax yesterday. Joseph L. Taylor, a steamer passenger, committed suicide by jumping from the steamer when she was two days out from Liverpool.

The Corsican left Halifax at 9:30 this morning. Over 200 passengers are coming to this port. There is a large general cargo aboard the steamer. The Corsican sails for Liverpool on return on Thursday.

Domestic Liner Cassandra, Captain Mitchell, will sail on Thursday for Glasgow direct.

Allan Liber Hesperian which left Havre on February 18, should reach port tomorrow. The steamer has a large cargo.

Several applications for leases of city lots will also be considered.

The Bridge Committee of the Common Council, Ald. W. E. Scully, convener, is meeting at City Hall this afternoon. Their report will be submitted at the meeting of the Common Council next Monday.
