MAYOR OF FREDERICKTON.

If the capital of a Province consisting of loyal people satisfied with a mayor who, not long since, expressed an earnest desire to repudiate the allegiance which he owed to his lawful sovereign, well and good;—this is a matter for the voters of Fredericton to determine. We fully sympathize with the material of which they are constituted if, however, they are thus satisfied. We copy the following article from the *Toronto Globe*. It affords a strong and conclusive manifestation of the feelings of the people of Toronto and its vicinity—consisting of men whose personal knowledge of the matter, well entitles them to express their convictions in reference to a serious evil which it is possible they may have encountered. When the *Protestants* of Western Canada view the condition of the *Catholics* of the Eastern portion of that fine Province, and compare the mental and physical degradation of the latter, with the intelligence and active prosperity of the former, it is no wonder that they dread the evil which by which they are threatened, and adopt the most energetic means to prevent so great a calamity.

This great meeting of *Irishmen*, disappearing of the proposed Emigration of Roman Catholics from the United States to Canada, was held last evening in the St. Lawrence Hall, in the City. A second deputation was received at the News Room Yesterday, and it furnishes nothing of material interest in addition to what we gave in our last. The following are the most important items—

The London Times announces that the 18th Regt. and a battalion of Rifles were ordered to be despatched to Canada, and several other Regiments will follow so as to concentrate a powerful Army in that country. Every preparation is making for the equipment.

It is rumored that almost every Regt. attached to the home service, has received instructions that their services may be required in Canada.

The Duke of Norfolk is dead.

The War in Asia.—On the 5th Jan. 6 Battalions of Russians surprised a Battalion of Turks near Longjewell, the latter retreating leaving their guns and baggage. The Russians subsequently burnt the Pacha's Palace and several Villages.

PEACE REVIEWS.—There is much gossip about the Peace Conference. Baron Bruun is reported to have said that Russia is sincerely desirous of but peace be not made within 3 or 4 weeks from opening of the Conference, serious difficulties might interfere with the final settlement of the question.
