GALLAGHER WAS IN A SERIOUS PLIGHT

Key Broken Off in Lock of His Cell Door Rendered Necessary Removal of Part of Wall.

A youth named Gallagher, who, with another, is in the county jail charged with stealing money from W. J. Dalton's store, was certainly securely locked in his cell on Monday. When the turnkey locked the cell door the long key broke off in the lock and all attempts to pick out the portion that remained was unavailing. In the early morning a contractor was summoned to the jail and after looking over the situation he found that the only manner to liberate the prisoner without breaking down the heavy steel door was to take away part of the partition into which the bolt fitted.

A workman with chisels and mallet was set to work and a large portion of the brick work had to be cut away so that the bolt would clear the door opening on its hinges. It was late in the afternoon before the door was opened and young Gallagher was removed to another cell. It was then necessary to procure the services of a locksmith who, after much difficulty, removed the lock from the door and took it to his shop where there was considerably difficulty in removing the broken key.

The work of a mason was next in order to replace the section of the wall that had been cut away. The lock was replaced and this afternoon after curfew had been sounded the cell was again made ready for occupancy by a prisoner. Had the jail taken fire during Monday morning the only way that the prisoner could have been liberated in a hurry to save his life would have been by breaking down the steel door with a sledge.

ROSSI'S CASE WAS HEARD YESTERDAY

Policeman Crawford Gave Evidence as to Finding of Siracusa's Body—Prisoner Studying His Italian Bible.

Giovanni Rossi was brought into the police court again yesterday morning and he listened, seemingly unmoved, to the evidence of Policeman Rankine who told of the finding of Siracusa's body. The witness testified that on Sunday afternoon, June 26th, he was doing duty at York Point and in consequence of what a boy named Joseph Jones had told him, they went to Diego Siracusa's house at 37 North street. In the rear they found the window open. Witness entered through the window into a kitchen and while there heard a man groan. He found Siracusa lying in his underclothing on a bed in an adjoining room. Witness spoke to the man, but received no answer. These men were produced in court by Detective Killen and all blood-stained. They were identified by the witness. There was only one bed in the house.

Witness produced a revolver which had been found in the bedroom and had been handed to witness by Dr. Berryman. Every chamber in the revolver was loaded. This man, who made an examination and ordered the man's removal to the hospital.

When found the pillows and sheets were covered with blood. These articles were produced in court by Detective Killen and all blood-stained. They were identified by the witness. There was only one bed in the house.

On the floor of the bedroom was found one full flask of liquor and an empty one. The case was adjourned until Friday morning at 10.15 o'clock, when it is expected that the preliminary examination will be concluded and the prisoner will be committed for trial in the Supreme court on the fourth week in September.

Will Air Case in Court.

The police have reported St. Clair McKel and Ward Stevens for fighting together on Elm St. extension Monday afternoon. Yesterday morning McKel, with his face marked as the result of the conflict, appeared in the police court and wished to lay an information against Stevens for assault, and as the two men had been reported for fighting he was told to appear in court this morning, when the magistrate will hear the case.

Award Set Aside.

In the chancery division of the supreme court yesterday the chief justice announced that on June 5th he had rendered a written judgment setting aside the arbitrator's award with costs in the cases of Gordon vs. the City of St. John, and Sluth and Guinlon vs. the city of St. John. The case was tried at the June sittings, M. G. Teed, K. C., appeared for the plaintiffs and C. N. Skinner, K. C., for the city.

LITTLE ELOQUENCE BUT MUCH BUSINESS AT COUNTY COUNCIL

Councillors Yesterday Afternoon Wasted No Time in Talk—\$25,000 Voted for Sewerage System in Lancaster—Committee Appointed to gate J. Ps.—More Lights for Fairville.

There was little eloquence vested at the meeting of the County Council yesterday afternoon, and a good deal of business was transacted. It was decided to issue debentures to the amount of \$25,000 to construct a sewerage system in Lancaster, and another issue of \$25,000 to refund the indebtedness on the hospital. It was also decided to investigate the administration of the liquor license laws, and to find out why the justices of the peace did not send in returns of convictions and fines collected.

Those present were: Coun. To-Goldrick, Russell, Sproul, White, Potts, Holder, Elkin, Baxter, Willet, Wigmore, Vanwart and Hayes of St. John, and Wm. Fox, L. M. Curran, W. P. Barnhill, of Lancaster; J. M. Donovan, F. K. Adams, R. G. Stewart, of Simonds; F. M. Cochran, C. F. Black, R. Connelly, of St. Martins; J. K. Corcadden, Wm. J. Dean of Musquash.

Before the council convened Chief Justice Barker administered the oath of office to the councillors, and other public officials who were present. Warden Connelly then took the chair and the minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

Coun. Baxter brought in the finance committee's report. Section 1 recommended that Burton Gerow's salary be paid monthly; adopted. Section 2 asked for a standing order regarding payments of telephone company's bill; adopted. Section 3 recommended the adoption of the voucher and check system, and an ante and post audit of accounts; adopted. Section 4 dealt with bonds on account of the hospital falling due in 1912, and recommended a new issue to refund the old debentures amounting to \$25,000. It was adopted. A number of bills were recommended for payment, and the report adopted as a whole.

The Municipal Building Again. In submitting the report of the building committee, Coun. McGoldrick said a committee had been appointed some years ago to consider the question of putting up a municipal building but that nothing had been done. The report recommended a steel roof for the court house, and the installation of electric lighting. The first section was adopted.

Coun. Baxter said that in view of the possibility of the erection of a municipal building with provincial assistance it might not be worth while to erect an old building like the court house.

Secretary Kelley stated that Architect Mott had yet submitted a preliminary report upon the proposed municipal building. He said that if a report was prepared showing the cost of different offices, required by the city and county, it might be found that the rent being paid would pay 6 per cent on the investment required for a fine building.

It was decided to have the court house wired, provided the cost was not over \$200. The third section recommending the painting of the court house interior was adopted. It was also decided to have the stone work of the county jail painted, and the gutters repaired, by day's work.

Coun. Donovan submitted a report upon the work being done by the prisoners in the county jail. It was the intention, he said, to put them to work for four or five weeks on the Fenhill Cemetery Road.

On motion of Ald. Russell it was decided to give the jail guards 10 days' holidays. Coun. Cochran moved that the county secretary, treasurer and auditor be absent two weeks' holidays, but the motion was not carried.

Part of the areas were conveyed to the Canadian Coal Lands Limited, a company incorporated in the State of Maine by Shaw. This conveyance was made by Robinson at Shaw's request.

Robinson, on the other hand, claims that it was not a sale at all but a transfer was made to the corporation in trust to be placed upon the market for four or five weeks on the Fenhill Cemetery Road.

Eighty Pilgrims Left for Ste. Anne

Extra Cars Required Yesterday to Accommodate the Passengers Enroute to World Famous Shrine.

Three extra cars were attached to the Ocean Limited yesterday to accommodate the large number of people leaving on the pilgrimage to the shrine of St. Anne de Beauséjour, Quebec. In all about eighty persons left here.

A party of nineteen from the parish of Weymouth, Digby Co., N. S., arrived in the city yesterday accompanied by their parish priest, Rev. P. N. Dion, and four from the parish of St. Croix, in charge of Rev. P. C. Philbault. Some little trouble was experienced with a party of Syrian pilgrims that arrived here Monday night on the steamer Aurora from Eastport, Me. Altogether they had only \$74 and the Immigration officers refused to allow them to proceed unless the balance of the money, which would amount to \$126, was raised. Arthur Wakin, interpreter for the U. S. Immigration, communicated with Ottawa and arrangements were made whereby the Syrians were allowed to continue on their pilgrimage, providing they should immediately leave Canada upon their return.
