GREEKS AND FREDERICTON SPLIT EVEN AT CAPITAL YESTERDAY— TEN INNINGS TO DECIDE LAST GAME

Fredericton, May 26.—Fredericton and St. John divided the honors here today in the opening games of the New Brunswick and Maine League season in Fredericton. Both games had thrilling finishes, St. John winning the morning contest by a score of 9 to 8, when Fredericton made a whirlwind finish scoring six runs in the last session. In the afternoon game Fredericton won out by a score of 4 to 3, the game going ten innings. The afternoon was as fine a ball game as ever was played in Fredericton and the 1,000 spectators were pleased with the brand of baseball played and the fighting spirit shown by both teams.

The morning affair was marked by some weird decisions by Umpire McCann who had trouble getting the players and had to chase Ganley and Spring, of the Fredericton, and O'Brien of the Greeks, out of the game. It is said that the players will each be fined \$5 or \$10 apiece for losing their heads and bad language used. McCann's work was about the worst ever seen here. He was bad on balls and strikes for both teams, and the climax came when he called a ball that Ganley past first a foul and broke up the Fredericton's ninth, inning rally. Fredericton blames McCann for the loss of the game.
