

## ADDRESS TO JUDGE CHANDLER AT ST. ANDREW'S

Presented on Behalf Bar of  
Charlotte Co. — No Crimi-  
nal Docket, Sheriff Pre-  
sents Him with White  
Gloves.

St. Andrews, N. B., Oct. 3.—The Circuit Court for Charlotte county met here at noon today with Mr. Justice Chandler presiding. There was not any business of any kind for the court, the three criminal cases, which were awaiting trial at this court, having been disposed of by Speedy Trial on the day previous.

The Sheriff presented His Honor with a pair of white kid gloves, in the absence of a criminal docket, and as an emblem of the legal purities that exist in Charlotte county.

It being the first visit of Judge Chandler to the county, he was presented with an address on behalf of the Barriers, as follows:

To the Honorable William B. Chandler, Judge of the Supreme Court, Province of New Brunswick:

May it please your Honor,—  
The members of the Bar, who reside and practise in Charlotte county, take great pleasure in extending to your Honor a most cordial and hearty welcome to this county on this, your first judicial visit.

They also offer you their sincere congratulations on the appointment you have recently received from the King's representative, to a position that is in itself exalted; that carries grave responsibilities in the performance of its duties, and in your Honor's case, the Barriers of Charlotte county are proud to believe is a just recognition of high standing at the Bar of that industry and integrity which always brings merited reward.

Your Honor's career at the Bar has been long and most honorable, and the recognition you have received for many years, as one of the leaders in the legal profession of this province, carries a sense of conviction, that your appointment to the Supreme Court bench will add much strength to the judiciary of the province, and continue in an intensified degree that splendid assurance, of which we have always been proud, that in the courts of New Brunswick, even handed justice will continue to be dealt out to all classes, irrespective of those minor considerations which temporarily separate men in matters of sentiment and conviction, socially, religiously and politically.

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## HARTLAND MAN LOSES FRUITS OF SUMMER'S TOIL

Fire Wipes Out Barns of Asa Kennedy—Were Filled with Season's Crop—Loss Nearly \$5,000.

Hartland, Oct. 3.—The large barns belonging to Asa Kennedy were burned to the ground tonight. They were filled with the season's crop of hay and grain which in less than an hour was nothing but a glowing mass of embers. Willing hands helped to remove the horses and cattle from the burning buildings after which there was nothing to do but watch the structures and the contents being consumed and to protect a house nearby with water which was done by a volunteer bucket brigade, the locality being outside the water limits of the town.

Mr. Kennedy had only been a few minutes away from the buildings, where he had been milking, when fire was seen to break through the roof on the northern end of the main barn. From that the destruction was rapid and the fruits of his summer's toil were entirely swept away. The loss is estimated at \$5,000, with only a small insurance on the buildings.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18  
years old, may homestead a quarter-section of  
available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan  
or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person  
at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for  
the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any  
Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency),  
on certain conditions.

Truties—Six months residence upon and cultivation  
of the land in each of three years. A home-  
steader may live within nine miles of his home-  
stead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain con-  
ditions. A habitable house is required except  
where residence is performed in the vicinity.  
In certain districts a homesteader in good stand-  
ing may accept a quarter-section alongside his  
homestead.

Rule—Six months residence in each of three  
years after receiving a residence patent; also 80 acres  
of rough, scrubby or stony land, or any stock  
may be substituted for cultivation under certain  
conditions.
