

ADDRESS TO JUDGE CHANDLER AT ST. ANDREW'S

Presented on Behalf Bar of Charlotte Co. — No Criminal Docket, Sheriff Presents Him with White Gloves.

St. Andrews, N. B., Oct. 3.—The Circuit Court for Charlotte county met here at noon today with Mr. Justice Chandler presiding. There was not any business of any kind for the court, the three criminal cases, which were awaiting trial at this circuit, having been disposed of by speedy trial on the day previous.

The Sheriff presented His Honor with a pair of white kid gloves, in the absence of a criminal docket, and as an emblem of the legal purities that exist in Charlotte county.

It being the first visit of Judge Chandler to the county, he was presented with an address on behalf of the Barriers, as follows: To the Honorable William B. Chandler, Judge of the Supreme Court, Province of New Brunswick:
