TORONTO WON CHAMPIONSHIP

FROM MONTREAL CANADIENS

Queen City Team Will Now Play Pacific Coast
Champions for the Stanley Cup—The Game in
Montreal Last Night Proved Very Rough—The
Score Was 4 to 3.

Montreal, Mar. 13.—Toronto won the championship of the N. H. L. and the right to play the Pacific Coast League champions for the Stanley Cup tonight when the Canadiens failed to wipe out the four-goal lead the Queen City team secured on their own ice in the first of the home and home games Monday night. The Canadiens won tonight's match by four to three, leaving the complete score for the series: Toronto ten, Canadiens seven.

Toronto never forgot the lead they enjoyed and whenever in real danger dropped into a defensive which easily and successfully checkedmate the on-man efforts of the Frenchmen.
