

GOV'T GOES DOWN TO DEFEAT
LIBERAL LANDSLIDE DEEPLY BURIES THE ADMINISTRATION OF RT. HON. ARTHUR MEIGHEN

Ontario Results Up To Midnight Showed There Was No Hope of Government Winning the Fight for Honest Policies.

Quebec, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island Returned Liberals from Every Constituency—Liberal Victory in Maritime Provinces Greater Than Supporters of Mr. King Had Hoped for.

DOMINION SUMMARY
At midnight, with every constituency east of Saskatchewan complete with the single exception of Frontenac in Ontario, returns from which will likely not be available tonight, Hon. Mackenzie King has a clear majority of the 235 members comprising the new House of Commons, being a total of 118, with possible acquisitions in British Columbia.

York-Sunbury True To Traditions of The Constituency

R. B. Hanson, K. C., Conservative, Elected Over Col. Osborne by About 800.

Fredericton, Dec. 6.—York-Sunbury in today's election stood true to the traditions of the constituency and the principles of the Conservative party.

The United Farmers' strength showed itself in some sections of the outlying parishes, but the centres of population, almost without exception, voted Conservative.
Fredericton, Devon and Marysville did particularly well for Mr. Hanson, giving him a lead of 821 which it was impossible for the supporters of Colonel Osborne to overcome in the smaller places.

Heavy Vote Polled.
A heavy vote was polled, upwards of 14,000, with a total registration of 22,900. This was about 1,000 more than in the by-election.

LIBERAL PARTY MAKES CLEAN SWEEP IN NOVA SCOTIA AND ISLAND

Get An Even Break in New Brunswick—Minister of Public Works Goes to Defeat in Colchester County, Losing to Mr. Putnam—E. K. Spinney Also Falls.

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 6.—Making a clean sweep of Nova Scotia, sixteen seats, and Prince Edward Island, four seats, and carrying of less than five, possibly six, of the eleven New Brunswick seats, the Liberal party, under the leadership of W. L. Mackenzie King, emerged from the Maritime with twenty-five of a possible thirty-one seats as a result of today's general election.

Said He Always Felt That Conditions Surrounding the Contest Made the Result Most Uncertain.

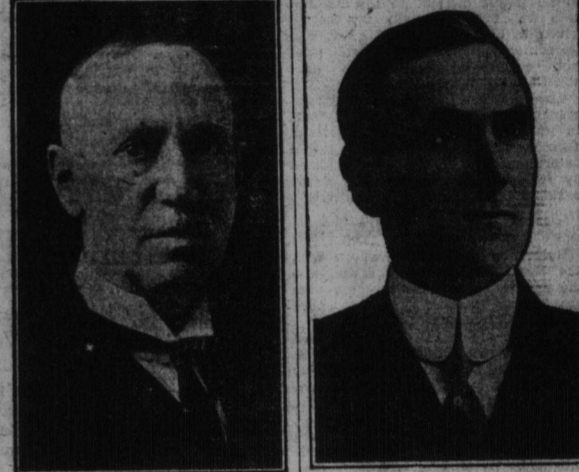

Notwithstanding the fact that in fighting the fight of the Meighen administration in the Maritime Provinces, he has found it necessary to absent himself from his own constituency, the electors of the City and County of St. John and the County of Albert, did not forget to give to the man whose wonderful ability, integrity and capacity for leadership are so well known, a glowing mark of their appreciation by according him a splendid majority.

Addressed Admirers

The new members in the Dominion Parliament for St. John-Albert were called upon to address the gathering, and on teaching the platform they were cheered again and again. Hon. Dr. Baxter, who was personally successful both in his own constituency and as the responsible minister for the Provinces of New Brunswick, proved himself to be great in the eyes of the people, and his remarks were cheered time and again.
