CONCLUSION.

E are pleased to have received this year, and to have been enabled to review more volumes of Proceedings than usual. Some few Reports that only reached us after the bulk of the foregoing review was in print, are, unfortunately, out of their proper alphabetical order. But this is unadvoidable.

Many of the Foreign Correspondence Reports that have come under our notice this year, bear marks of extraordinary scholarship and of a profound knowledge of Masonic lore, as well as of exceptional literary ability. Our reading of them has afforded us both pleasure and profit. May we be so fortunate in the near future as to be favored with more of the same handiwork.

It is gratifying to be able to note the almost entire disappearance of subjects of Masonic dispute. In the absence of these, the leaders and students of the Craft have been able to devote more time and attention to their researches into the inner mysteries and higher teachings of the Order.
