Effect Follows Cause If there is one law of the universe more invariable in its operation than any other, it is that which says that no person, or aggregation of persons, may work an injustice upon another individual, or aggregation of individuals, without having to pay the penalty—not only the generation which perpetrates the iniquity, but succeeding generations until the scales are balanced, and in some cases it would appear that the balance is exceeded in the direction of retribution.

As a case in point, take the treatment which the people of the American colonies, and later the United States, meted out to the negroes when they were ruthlessly torn from their native land and carried away as so many chattels to become the slaves of the white man. Because of that injustice, the people of the United States were torn by four years of bloody civil war, which resulted in freeing the negro, but which could not elevate him to the full status of citizenship in the greater part of that country.

The negro has a vote, but he dare not exercise it in any of the states of the South today. As a result of the injustice done years ago, riots and lynchings occur with alarming frequency in many parts of the United States.

The negro has put the brand of Cain upon the people who enslaved him, and it will be many generations before they escape. In fact, it is hard to see where the fates of these two races, which were brought together by Man's inhumanity to Man, will ever again become dissociated.

He is also slowly merging his blood with that of his white neighbors, and, while it may not be noticeable for generations, the time will ultimately arrive when the features of the typical American of that day in certain parts of the United States, will bear greater resemblance to the Ethiopian ancestor than to the Caucasian.

Ireland and Poland are other instances of the working out of the same law, and it does not take much prescience to predict that similar retribution will follow the action of the Peace Conference, particularly in the case of Shantung, in the name of Humanity.

NATIONAL W. C. T. U.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 13.—White ribbons fluttered in St. Louis yesterday. Women of every creed and station, wearing the snowy badge of the W. C. T. U., attached to emblems from the various States, poured into the city on every train. They are the delegates to the annual national convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the sessions of which will begin to-morrow and continue an entire week.

The convention promises to be one of the most notable in the history of the well-known organization. It will be in the nature of a jubilation over the nation-wide prohibition victory. Combined with the jubilee will be a celebration of the forty-fifth anniversary of the W. C. T. U., which was first organized at a conference held in Cleveland in 1874.

With the main object for which the society was organized now about to become an accomplished fact, the coming convention will consider a program for its future work along various lines of social endeavor. The nature of its future activities is indicated by the list of subjects scheduled for consideration by the convention. These include Americanization, child welfare, and young people's welfare.

WOMEN TO CONFER

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 13.—Arrangements are being made for the entertainment of a most notable gathering of women in San Antonio early next month, when representative women of four of the Southwestern States will meet here for a conference with representatives of the leading women's clubs and similar organizations in Mexico. The States to be represented will include this bordering on the southern republic—Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and Southern California. Discussion of the problems affecting women and adoption of a program for cooperative effort among the women of the four States and Mexico in advancing their interests is expected.

THE G.T.R. DEAL WILL BE DELAYED

Audit of Books and Shareholders Meeting First.

Ottawa, Nov. 11.—Acquisition by the Government of the stock of the G. T. R. System is likely to be a somewhat lengthy process, according to information obtainable here. The board of arbitrators, two members of which remain to be selected, will have to be appointed and there is, as yet, no indication of the names of the men who will represent the Government and the Grand Trunk Company. Sir Walter Cassels will be the third member.

Drawing up Agreement. Meantime the Government is going ahead with the preparation of the agreement based upon the bill passed by Parliament. This agreement which will be submitted to the G. T. R. shareholders by Sir Alfred Smithers, who will return to England on his completion for that purpose, is a rather difficult document to draw up. It is understood that its preparation is in charge of Hon. Arthur Meighen, although other ministers are probably assisting him. It was stated to-day at a department of railways that drafting the agreement and its submission to the G. T. R. shareholders could hardly be started until a month at the least, while a longer time might be required for the completion of this stage of the matter.

Then the Arbitrators.

The agreement once ratified, both sides will go to work to draw up their cases for submission to the arbitrators. An audit of the G. T. R. Company's books and a valuation of the physical assets of the road will have to be made by the Government before it is ready to submit its case to the arbitrators. This may be a lengthy process which will probably occupy a couple more months. Indications are that the actual court proceedings will not be started before the end of January. As the head office of the G. T. R. in Canada is situated in Montreal and of the G. T. R. in Winnipeg, it is likely that the sittings of the court will be largely confined to these cities.
