



(Special to The Record) OTTAWA, May 26.—Sir Robert Borden, prime minister of Canada, returned to-day to the capital from the Peace conference. He left, in the fall, a country at war; he came back to-day, to a country at peace. There must have been few outward signs of the change visible to him as he drove through the streets of the city. For many months Canada's premier has been right at the stait of great events in two of the world' great events in two of the word's greatest centers. The calm quietude of Ottawa's reception must have struck on his senses like a touch of cold water. As the train drew into the central sta-tion at 10.30, Sir Robert Borden stood on the observation platform at the end barcheaded. There were about four hundred people present.
