

THE NEW EXTRADITION TREATY.
Full Text of the Document—*Minister*
Answers Question to his Government.

New York, July 20.—The Tribune publishes the full extradition treaty with Great Britain, the following being its substance:

Article I.—The provisions of the 10th Article of the said treaty will be, and are hereby extended so as to apply and extend to all persons who have committed crimes not mentioned in the said article, namely:—1. Manslaughter. 2. Burglary. 3. Embezzlement or larceny to the value of £100. 4. Rape. 5. Injuries to real property, whereby the life of any person all be endangered if such injuries constitute a crime according to the laws of either country. 6. All other crimes provided for in the provisions of the said article shall have the same effect with respect to the extradition of persons charged with any of them as those which have already been originally named and specified in the said article.

theirs therein, respectively named and
specified, whose sentence thereupon shall
not have been rendered. In the case of
a fugitive criminal alleged to have been
convicted of crime for which his surren-
der is asked a copy of the record of the
conviction, and of the sentence of the
court before which such conviction took
place duly authenticated, shall be pro-
duced, together with the evidence that
the prisoner is the person to whom such
sentence refers.

Article 4.—No fugitive criminal shall be surrendered under the provisions of any treaty or of this Convention, if the demand in respect of which his surrender is demanded be one of a political character, or if he prove to be the competent

Article 5.—A fugitive criminal surrendered to either of the high contracting parties under the provisions of said treaty of this Convention, shall not until he had the opportunity of returning to the State by which he has been surrendered, be detained or tried for any crime

the extradition crime proved by facts on which his surrender was granted.

Article 6.—The extradition of fugitives under the provision of said treaty and present convention shall be carried out in the United States and in Her Majesty's dominions respectively, subject and in conformity with the laws regulating the extradition for the time being in force in each country.

Article 7.—This convention shall be ratified, and ratifications exchanged at London as soon as possible. It shall enter into force ten days after its publication in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the high contracting parties, and shall continue in force until one or other of the high contracting parties shall signify its wish to terminate it and abide by it no longer. Minister Phelps in a letter to Secretary

substantial particulars so nearly to
form heretofore prepared by me and
