My dear Eugenet

Have just returned from the West and have yours of 26th.

First of all, I have not the least doubt that what you advise you sincerely believe to be in the interests of the country, and I am sure I can go further and say you sincerely believe it to be in my interests. However, I have refrained from making public statements since being chosen Leader a year ago—that is, except in the election and on very special occasions. I hardly think I should break the rule and do so now. I may, and probably will, rafer to this matter, though, on the floor of the Convention, and I want to study it thoroughly first.

Have been driven at a terrific rate for a long time; in fact, am working far harder than I ever intended to work, or indeed want to, certainly harder than I should. Am worrying much how I am going to get a few minutes to think out my line at Winnipeg.
