The Mississaugas have all along constituted a separate band and have had no voice in the affairs of the Six Nations nor have the Six Nations exercised any control over the affairs of the Mississaugas. The Mississaugas elect their councillors under the provisions of the Advancement Act while the Six Nations are governed by life Chiefs. They have each, also, their own Agent, Mr. E. D. Cameron, of Brantford, being in charge of the Six Nations, and Mr. W. C. Van Loon, of Hagersville, of the Mississaugas.

4. The line of the Hamilton and Lake Erie Railway Company passes through the North half of Lot 6, in the 1st Concession of Oneida, which lot is now a part of the lands of the Mississaugas of the Credit.

The right of way was not paid for, but improvements belonging to individual Indians, it would appear from the correspondence, were paid for or arranged for by the Railway Company with each individual.

The valuation for the right of way and improvements were made separately for each individual occupant by the then Indian Agent at Brantford and dated the 2nd April, 1873.

The Department is now in correspondence with the Grand Trunk Railway Company: there is a prospect of an adjustment being arrived at with respect to the payment of the above mentioned right of way and for one claim for improvements which it appears has been left unpaid by the Railway Company and has been brought to the attention of the Department.
