APPRECIATION OF THE GREAT CRAFTSMAN AND SOCIALIST.

His Fame in Literature Will Be Aristecratic in Two Distinct Respects-An Anomalous Fact When the Demecratic Nature of His Literary Ideals is Considered-His Work in Making Common Things Beautiful.

Nine years have passed since Wilham Morris' death, and it is not per-haps overbold to predict the way in which he will come to be regarded by the new generations which must pass judgment on the old reputations. It is already sufficiently evident that his fame in literature will be aristocratic both as regards the restricted limits of its scope and as regards the refine-ment of taste which the appreciation ment of taste which the appreciation of his prose and verse demands. This fact is in itself anomalous, when we consider the democratic nature of Morris' literary ideals. Then as regards art, we must recognize the fact that his significance lay chiefly in the impetus which he gave towards the creation of beautiful things, and towards a healthler conception of the part which heauty should play in the every a healthier conception of the part-which beauty should play in the every-day life of the people. He was not, apart from literature, in any high sense a creative artist, but an inspired and zealous craftsman, with strong and often sane convictions, which he had force enough to impress upon his gen-eration.

eration.
What interests one most deeply in Morris is the ease and mastery with which he passed continually from one absorbing occupation to another, and therewithal the unity of purpose and the rugged sincerity which underlay this apparent diversity. We know him first as a boy at Mariborough College whatting his curiestly on the Romer first as a boy at Mariborough College whetting his curiosity on the Roman and pre-Celtic remains of that district, and gathering those impressions of natural beauty which pass like a gleaming thread through the prose and verse of his maturer years. Oxford, about whose grey towers something still lingered of the enchantment of the middle ages, stimulated his love of architectural beauty, a love that was deepened until it became a passion by his journeys on foot among the Gothic cathedrals of northern France. Oxford gave him, too, the inspiration of a kindred spirit, his life-long friend and associate in all his labors, Burne-Jones. sociate in all his labors, Burne-Jones. Then followed the comparatively brief infatuation for Rossetti, who was old enough and emperious enough to become the master spirit of that early group. At Rossetti's instance and under his inspiring yet erratic guidance Morris for several years strove loyally to gain a mastery in painting. To this end he abandoned his chosen profession of architecture, but for the first and last time in his life he was forced to acknowledge himself beaten. However, with Morris every experience was turned to ultimate advantage, and even this painting venture can scarcely be considered as a false start, for it gave him a securer mastery of detail and a surer Then followed the comparatively brief securer mastery of detail and a surer sense of color in the decorative work of sense of color in the decorative work of later years. Already he had given evidence of original power and exceptional facility in both prose and verse, and it must certainly have puzzled his friends to know the precise direction that his creative energy would take. get really poor. It was to the peculiar union of the ideal and the practical in his nature that his success in the fields oh which he ventured is due." In the intervals of this exacting yet joyous labor at various handicrafts, which embraced, apart from the general management of the business, in-numerable experiments in dyeing, weav-ing, embroidery and stained glass, Mor-ris found time to produce poetry which in its extent and in its strikingly orig-inal quality takes high rank in a period when poetry was both abundant and powerful. These poems can never be in an age not wholly alive to poetry, pop-ular, nor in an age not wholly dead to poetry can they be neglected. Two things especially command attention in Morris' poetical work: first, the devout and racy mediaevalism of the early pieces, and, secondly, in his greater period, the story-telling quality. All modern attempts in the mediaeval maneral management of the business, inmodern attempts in the mediaeval manner must perforce be factitious, and in his poetry no more than in his decoration can it be said that Morris recapture ed quite the spirit of the middle ages. But the inspiration which he drew from the thirteenth century and from the art already tinged with self-consciousart already tinged with self-conscious-ness of Chaucer's century was more vital and unaffectedly genuine than in the case of any other author in a per-iod of mediaeval worship, both sham and sincere. His narrative poems, which contain almost all the really great stories of the world, were a re-action, and a timely one, against the modern habit of sentimental introspec-tion and soul forture which Morris se tion and soul torture, which Morris so heartily loathed. Prolix these poems doubtless are, and deficient in consequence in the intensity which strikes in tragic flashes from the pages of many a lesser poet. But Morris never wrought without a purpose, and the dearth in his poems of those splendidly isolated phrases which are dear to the quoter's heart was part of this conscious purpose. phrases which are dear to the quoter's heart was part of this conscious purpose. He felt that modern poetry had become too literary, and that the skill of the modern poet was devoted to the over-elaboration of individual passages, with a consequent loss of spontaneity, and with a frequent sacrifice of that unity of impression which a perfect poem, like a perfect picture, should convey. Morris is not, therefore, a poet vey. Morris is not, therefore, a poet of purple patches. Although never a careless artist I am convinced that he

careless artist I am convinced that he would have preferred to lapse into occasional roughness and naive incoherence rather than produce a phrase so redolent of literature as, for example, Tennyson's "Laborious orient ivory sphere in sphere."

Discussion of Morris' poetry, to be wholly satisfactory, cannot fail to deal with some of the question that I have touched upon, and Miss Cary's treatment of Morris' poetry gladees off the surface of the subject. However, she never fails to interest us, and her estimate of Morris in his many capacities is far from superficial. In conclusion is far from superficial. In conclusion I may say that I do not know any book more likely to stimulate an inter-est in Morris, or more reliable in the picture which it presents of this many-sided man.—Prof. Pelham Edgar, in To-ronto Globe.

F. Maclean Asks That Evidence Ge to House—Nova Scotia Systems.

w. F. Maclean Asks That Evidence Ge to House—Nova Scotia Systems.

Ottawa, May 3.—W. F. Maclean wanted the Telephone Committee to refer the evidence they had taken to the House and deal with the subject. It was, however, decided not to do so until the Bell people and the rallway companies had been heard.

Mr. Winnield, manager of the Nova Scotia Telephone Co, was examined at the Telephone Committee yesterday. He said that there was a telephone to every 74 persons in the Province. There were about 30-companies operating in the Province. The Nova Scotia Telephone Co, was about 18 years old. It had about 3,260 instruments, and its central was independent of the Bell company. It was paying six per cent, dividend and adding \$10,000 to reserve fund. The farmers in Nova Scotia did not use telephones. The company tried the experiment at Pictou. Some twelve farmers joined together to pay for one telephone, and the company, finding it was giving a whole district telephone service for some \$60, gave it up. The farmers could maintain their own service more cheaply. In reply to Johnston (Cape Breton), the witness said that the Bell could maintain their own service more cheapty. In reply to Johnston (Cape Breton), the witness said that the Bell company held 14 per cent. of the stock of the Nova Scotia Telephone Co., and had two directors on a board of seven.
