On Thursday evening, between the hours of seven and eight, an individual named Baptiste Corneau, going down Cote d'Ararheim, met three boys who were cruelly treating a dog which they had with them, attached to a sign. Corneau re-nostated against their brutality, but only received an impudent answer; and he consequently gave Touchette, the most insolent of them, a slap with the back of his hand. The latter immediately drew a clasp-knife, and made an overhand plunge at Corneau, slightly wounding him on the chin; the blow was instantly repeated, and the knife entered his breast, inflicting a wound from the effects of which he died, in the most excruciating agony, about three hours afterwards. One of the police patrols arrived shortly after the affray, and secured the three boys, who were lodged in jail.—Touchette is only fifteen years of age, but has been for some time known as a desperate and incorrigible character, and arrived a few days ago from Paris. The other two boys are named Seronin and Langueque, the former 13 and the latter 14 years of age. Langueque has been for some time going about the town selling plaster of Paris figures. On his person was found a large knife, such as are commonly used by butchers; but it is not believed to be the instrument with which the fatal wound was inflicted.—The deceased was by trade a sawyer, twenty-two years of age, and resided with his parents at No. 39, Saint Vallier Street, St. Roch.

A coroner's inquest was held on the body yesterday afternoon, which resulted in a verdict of "Wild Murder" against the three prisoners, who have been fully committed for trial.
