ARRIVAL OF THE EUROPA.

The Europa arrived at Halifax yesterday P. M.; she left Liverpool on the 22nd June. Flour—dull at previous rates. No resignation of the Ministry yet. There has been an attempt to assassinate the French President.

New York, July 3. The Europa is below—will be up this evening. The Asia arrived at Liverpool on Saturday morning at 7 o'clock. Fifty persons are known to have been lost in the Liverpool and Glasgow steamer Orion, but no Americans appear in the list. Mr. and Mrs. Scott of Montreal, were among the lost. Great blame is attributed to the captain and mate of the steamer.—In the House of Commons, on Thursday Lord John Russell made a very brilliant speech in defence of the ministry relative to the Greek question, and treated the vote of censure on the part of the Lords in the most indignant manner. It is settled that so long as the ministry retain, as they now do, the confidence of the Commons they will retain their places. There now appears less probability than ever of a speedy adjustment of the difficulty between Lord Palmerston and General Lalitte. Particulars have not yet transpired of the attempt to assassinate the President.
