WAR DECLARED ON JAP FISHERS

British Columbia Indians And Whites Are Against Asiatics

PEOPLE APPEAL TO GOVERNMENT

The Ballot Will Be The Weapon In The Fight For Preference

New Westminster, B.C., July 6.—Five hundred or more solid votes will be the strongest weapon on the command of the Fraser River fishermen in their fight to eliminate the Japanese fishermen from the Fraser River, according to the plans outlined at a representative meeting of the Fraser River Fishermen's Protective Association held here. An active organization committee covering the drifts and districts from the Mission City to the Gulf of Georgia was appointed by President Maiden and an effort will be made to enroll five hundred fishermen and see that their names are placed on the voters' list.

The fishermen realize that they are a very important factor in the election, and it is by this large number of votes that they hope to have the following resolution passed at the meeting, favorably acted upon by the powers that be:

Resolution Adopted.

"As we consider that the Asiatics on the Fraser River are a deadly menace to this district, because they are steadily driving the white and Indian fishermen off the river and sapping the financial life of the Fraser Valley to the extent of approximately a million dollars a year, which is diverted from the local channels of trade and sent to an alien land, where it is lost to this section forever; that unless this steady, insidious invasion of the Asiatics is checked quickly one of the greatest commercial assets of our Province will pass entirely into the hands of aliens by nature if not by name, and all the benefits of our fishing industry will go to enrich the coffers of a nation across the sea; now, therefore, the Fraser River Fishermen's Protective Association, representing the white and Indian fishermen on the Fraser River from the Gulf of Georgia to the Mission City bridge, do hereby resolve:

Legislation Asked For

"That in order to preserve the fishing industry of the Fraser River to the white and Indian fishermen that the Dominion and Provincial Government be petitioned to enact legislation as follows:

"That no licenses be issued to Asiatics to fish above the Fraser River bridge at New Westminster.

"That in 1915 and thenceforth the number of licenses to be issued to Fraser River fishermen be restricted to a total to be agreed upon by the interested canneries and this association, and

"That in 1915 and thenceforth licenses shall be issued to white and Indian fishermen on the Fraser River for one month prior to their issuance to any other persons whatsoever."

Not a Fishermen's Union.

In connection with the restriction of licenses the fishermen have expressed a willingness to leave the matter in the hands of an arbitration Board or Board of Trade, in case no agreement can be arrived at between themselves and the cannery men. It was pointed out at the meeting that the association was in no manner a fishermen's union, nor were the members antagonistic to the cannery men, their principle being the driving of the Japanese from off the Fraser River.

"If our representatives at Ottawa and Victoria do not help us, we will work for those that will," was the way some of the fishermen put the matter after the meeting. "We have the votes, and we'll know how to use them," was the remark of another fisherman.

HAS A TON OF CHILDREN.

Their Average Weight Two Hundred and Eight Pounds Each

Eugene, Ore., July 6.—With ten children, whose weights total more than a ton, Mrs. John W. Laird, of Garfield, Wash., who has been visiting here, has a claim to one of the largest families in the Northwest. The mother weighs 135 pounds. Her heaviest son, aged twenty, weighs 295, and three others weigh 245 each. The youngest child is ten, the oldest thirty-five, and the total weight of the ten is 2,085 pounds, an average of 208.

VILLA'S TROOPS ARREST NEPHEW GEN. CARRANZA

Charge That He was Negligent in Defending a Town Entrusted To Him

El Paso, July 6.—Col. Carlo Carranza, nephew of the supreme chief of the Mexican revolution, has been arrested and brought to Juarez with fifty of his men and placed in jail. It is reported that some of them have been executed.

They are charged with having failed properly to defend a small town which they were garrisoning in the vicinity of Casas Grandes, south-east of Juarez, against an attack of Huerta filibusters. These filibusters are reported to have attacked the place and captured some of the horses of Carranza's troops.

Friends of Carranza on this side of the river declare that the charge is trumped up against him by Villa's men.
